We Have the Place, the Program, the People... *We need the Money!*

The consuming battle right now at Skidmore is how to fight the inflationary bulge. The college faces a \$500,000 deficit this fiscal year, and now as never before Skidmore needs help and strong support from her Alumnae.

We are not alone in the financial crisis, as you well know. Seventy per cent of the institutions studied by the Carnegie Commission are in financial difficulty or headed for trouble. President Palamountain has already written that Skidmore has been particularly hard hit because of "inflationary rises across the board in all our expenses (additional fuel price increases alone will add \$42,000 to the budget), unionization of our service personnel, and our low endowment." These factors give us a slimmer cushion than that rested on by comparable women's colleges.

Contrary to the gloom of budgetary squeezes, pride in accomplishment should help to make us realistic. The stunning strides made by Skidmore in the past decade are proof enough that our College needs and depends on Alumnae help. We must protect our investments.

We have been part of these accomplishments: 1. An entirely new 1,000-acre campus on which construction is more than half complete with 19 buildings in use or ready for occupancy and a 20th to be started soon. Two-thirds of the students live on the New Campus and two-thirds of the instruction takes place there.

2. Establishment of a NYC campus, a five-story building completely remodeled and opened in the fall of 1970, primarily for use as an education and residence building for nursing students who take clinical training in the city.

3. An increase in enrollment from 1,261 in the 1960-61 academic year to an anticipated 1,860 in 1970-71.

4. A successful new calendar on the "4-1-4 plan," providing a four-month fall term that ends before the holidays, a one-month winter term in January for concentration on a single course or individual project, and a four-month spring term ending late in May.

5. A completely revised curriculum adapted to the new calendar, with heavier emphasis on individual study, tutorials and seminars. Scores of new courses have been created for the winter term, some providing for study in distant parts of the country and overseas, with many students leaving the campus for independent study projects.

6. Inauguration of student exchanges with other colleges and universities.

7. Provision for cross-registration among Skidmore and eight other institutions of higher learning in the Capital district of the state.

8. Summer programs which include the SIX (Summer in Experiment) art program; Project PEP (Programs to Excite Potential) for underprivileged eighth and ninth grade students;

Project HOPE (Higher Opportunities for Education) which prepares students for college admission who normally would not qualify.

9. The approval of Skidmore to establish a Phi Beta Kappa chapter on campus.

10. A share in a federal grant to establish a pilot program, University Without Walls. This

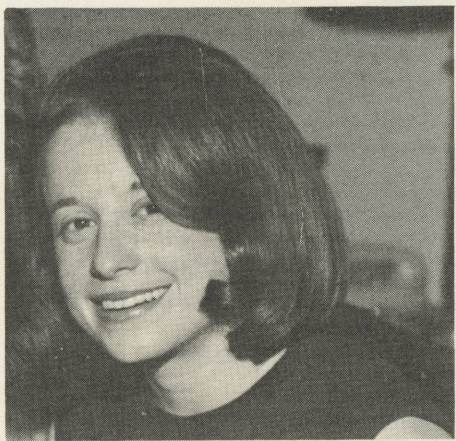

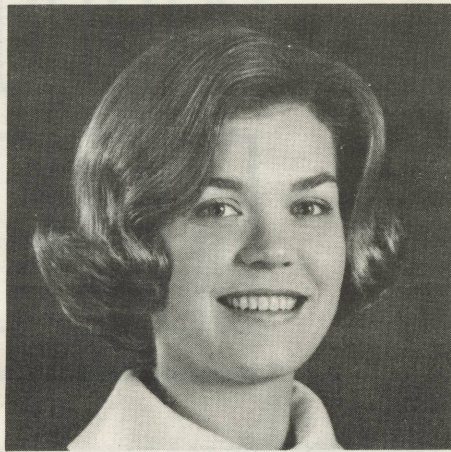

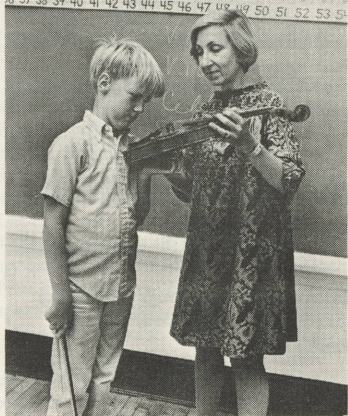
