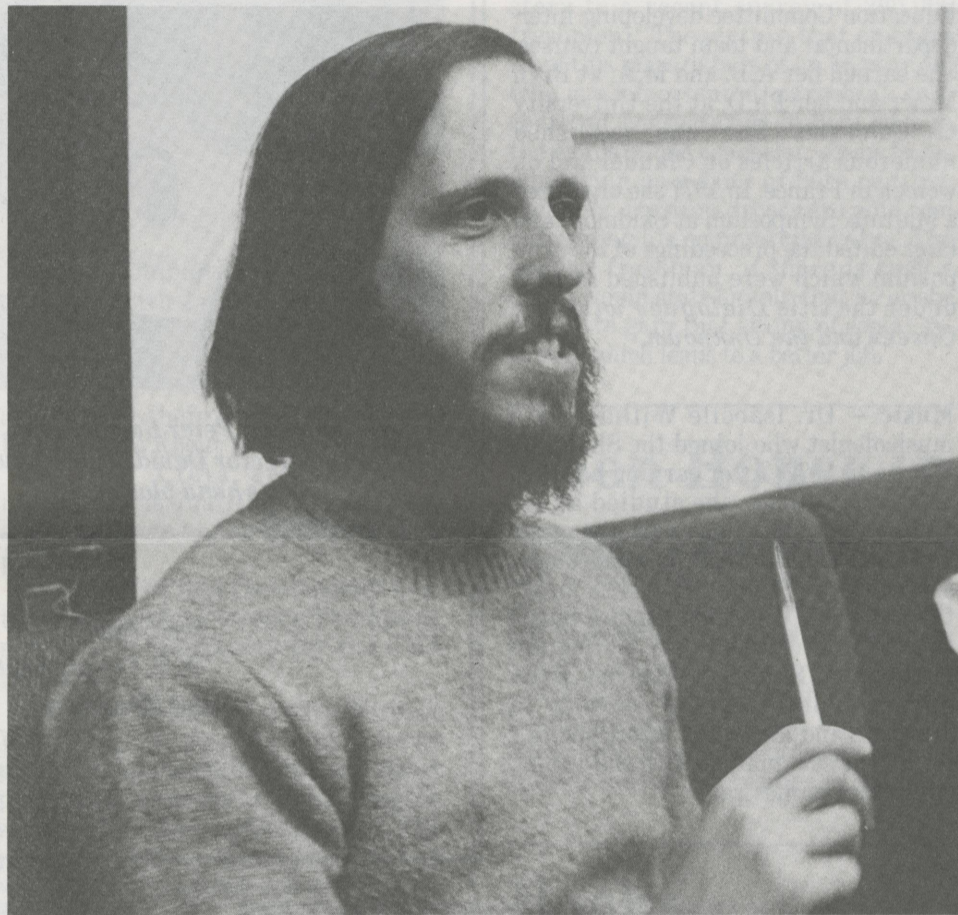
Robert Boyers, Faculty Research Lecturer Inaugurates Moseley Lecture

Robert Boyers, Professor of English and a member of the Skidmore faculty since 1969, delivered the twenty-third annual faculty research lecture on October 23. The lecture was entitled "The Novelist in His Time: Politics, Fiction, Autobiography." Before introducing Professor Boyers, President Palamountain announced that the annual lecture, a College tradition dating back to 1957, will henceforth be known as the Edwin M. Moseley Faculty Research Lecture in honor of Skidmore's former Provost and Dean of Faculty who died last December.

The lecture focused on a number of recent attempts, by writers like Saul Bellow and V. S. Naipal, to talk about political issues in ways that are both serious and personal. Along the way it raised questions about the writer's responsibility to confront his own time head on and to make himself a target for others who hold opposing views. Finally, it considered whether or not writers and other western intellectuals have the equipment to talk about international politics. What makes an American novelist believe he can contribute something useful on the subject of Israel? What can a middle class writer know about the misery of Indian peasants?

Distinguished Editor and Writer

The scope of Mr. Boyer's interests and accomplishments is reflected in the titles of the books he has written and/or edited to date. They include *R. D. Laing and Anti-Psychiatry*, *Psychological Man*, *Contemporary Poetry in America*, *The Legacy of the German Refugee Intellectuals* and *Excursions*, a selection of fifteen essays chosen from more than sixty published in noted British and American journals since 1965. Founder and editor of the influential quarterly *Salmagundi*, Professor Boyers is also the editor of the stunning arts quarterly, the *Bennington Review*. He reviews regularly for such publications as *The New Republic*, and *The London Times Literary Supplement* and has lectured at such institutions as Johns Hopkins University, Northwestern University, Bennington College, Boston University, the Center for 20th Century Studies at the University of Wisconsin, and the Library of Congress.



Professor Boyers earned his B.A. from Queens College and his Master's from New York University.

He is the recipient this year of a National Endowment for the Humanities Senior Research Grant and of a Rockefeller Foundation Award.

In 1975, Robert Boyers was selected as one of a group of outstanding educators of America, having been nominated for this honor by his department. The annual selection of the faculty research lecturer is made by the faculty and is also considered a signal honor...the highest, in fact, the faculty can confer upon one of its number.

The Edwin M. Moseley Lecture

In announcing the rechristening of the series, President Palamountain recalled that in 1957, President Val Wilson persuaded Edwin M. Moseley, writer, critic and professor of English at Washington and Jefferson, to come to Skidmore as first Dean of the Faculty. A decade later, Mr. Moseley

was invited to deliver the eleventh lecture in the faculty research series, "The Outsider as Hero and Anti-Hero." It was the same year in which he had also added the duties of Provost to his staggering burden of responsibilities. In 1976, he resigned the post to devote his full time to scholarship, writing and teaching.

Professor Moseley lectured and published widely, notably in the areas of Renaissance and Modern Literature. He was also a magnificent teacher. In the preface to *Renaissance and Modern: Essays in Honor of Edwin M. Moseley*, editor Murray Levith, Professor of English at Skidmore and a former student of Mr. Moseley observed: "We learned much about teaching by remembering his methods. He forgave ignorance and naivete and made each student feel bright and unique. No one felt uncomfortable in his classes. Imagination flourished. To paraphrase what the great Renaissance scholar Roger Ascham said of Sir John Cheke, he was for many of us 'teacher of all the little poore learning we have.'"

Background to the Olympics: A Symposium

Just prior to the opening of the winter Olympics at nearby Lake Placid, on February 13, Skidmore will host a symposium on the Olympics.

Sponsored by Skidmore, in cooperation with the National Association for Sport and Physical Education and the National Association for Physical Education in Higher Education, the symposium will deal with the problems facing the Olympics and their possible solution. With an academic and scholarly focus, the symposium will present some original theoretical and empirical research relative to the Olympics.

Keynoter for the event, scheduled for February 8-10, will be Sir Roger Bannister who 25 years ago, while a medical student at Oxford, became the first person to run a mile in under four minutes, in what the *New York Times* termed "one of history's great sports achievements...one of humanity's great accomplishments." Now one of England's most respected neurologists, Sir Roger has written and lectured widely on sports.

Some of the subjects to be covered by the symposium are the amateur-professional controversy, the nonpolitical stance of the Olympics movement, divergence between rules and behavior, the increase of nationalism in the Olympics - topics which are of interest both to academicians and sports enthusiasts.

Sharing the platform with Sir Roger are educators from a number of universities — John Loy from the University of Illinois, who specializes in the sociology of sport; John Lucas from Penn State, the history of sport; Rainer Martens, University of Illinois, psychology of sport; Eleanor Metheny, emeritus professor, University of Southern California, who specializes in the study of movement; and Robert G. Ousterhoudt, Arizona State University, specialist in the philosophy of sport.

On Campus New Chairpersons Appointed

Six new chairpersons appointed this fall took up their new offices in September. They are:

Art — Prof. Peter B. Baruzzi, who has taught drawing and painting at Skidmore since he joined the faculty in 1954. Baruzzi earned his B.F.A. at the Memphis Academy of Art and his M.F.A. at Syracuse University. He has displayed his paintings in many exhibitions - the Joslyn Art Museum, the State Capitol Building in Albany, Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Art, Addison Gallery of American Art, among others. Since 1956 he has been listed in *Who's Who in American Art*. In addition to his academic activities, he has been active in Saratoga Springs community affairs.

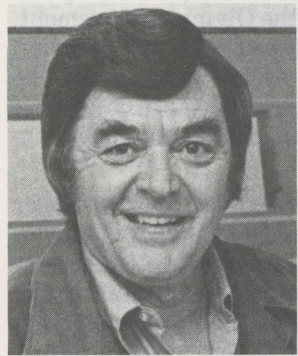
Government — Prof. Erwin L. Levine joined the Skidmore faculty in 1961. A specialist in American Government, Dr. Levine earned his A.B., M.A. and Ph.D. in political science from Brown University. He is the author of two books on Theodore Francis Green, the late Rhode Island U.S. senator: *Theodore Francis Green, the Rhode Island Years* and *Theodore Francis Green, the Washington Years*. He co-authored *An Introduction to American Government*, now in its fourth edition, used widely in the U.S. and by the Open University program in England. He has been active on campus, serving on a number of major committees. In 1972 he was honored as the faculty research lecturer for that year.

History — Dr. William E. Brynteson, a member of the history department since 1964, is chairing the department. A medievalist, Prof. Brynteson earned his B.A. in history at Yale and his M.A. and Ph.D. at the University of Wisconsin. He teaches ancient history as well

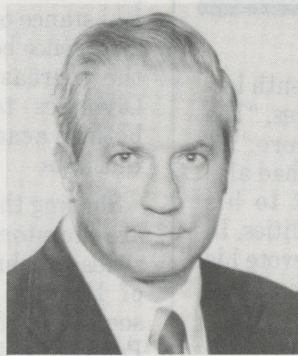
as medieval history and has published articles on Roman Law. Under grants from the American Philosophical Society and the American Council of Learned Societies, and the National Endowment for the Humanities, he has worked and studied abroad. He has been active on major campus committees, including a classical studies committee which initiated the program in Classical Studies. He has served as director of that program.

Modern Languages and Literatures — Dr. Lynne Gelber who joined the Skidmore faculty in 1966, has been active on major committees, particularly as chairperson of the first General Education Committee developing interdepartmental and team taught courses. She earned her A.B. and M.A. at Bryn Mawr and her Ph.D. at the University of Colorado. She has published numerous articles on Claudel and on women in France. In 1977 she organized a Malraux Symposium at Skidmore and later edited the proceedings of the symposium which were published in 1978 under the title *Dialogues with the Unseen and the Unknown*.

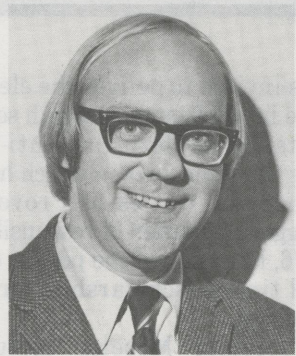
Music — Dr. Isabelle Williams is a musicologist who joined the Skidmore faculty in 1972. After earning her B.A. at Barry College, she studied at the University of Michigan and was awarded an M.M. and Ph.D. in musicology, serving as a teaching fellow in music theory. Prof. Williams teaches music theory and directs the Collegium Musicum at Skidmore. She has given numerous lectures and concerts in Michigan and in Florida where she performed as solo pianist with the Tampa Symphony Orchestra.

October 11 — November 11

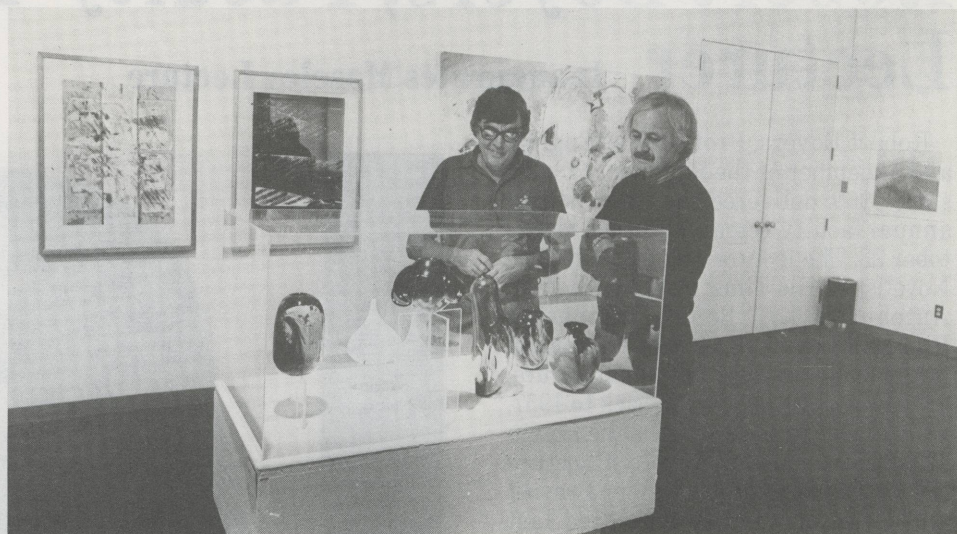

There is variety in media as well as subject in the exhibit which ranges from the abstract to the real.

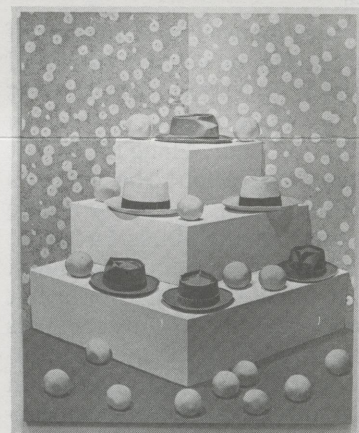
There are acrylics by Peter Baruzzi, Victor Liguori and David Miller, oil on canvas by Jeffrey Elgin and

Skidmore CDA Program Model

The Skidmore College Child Development Associates (CDA) Program, a special project to train professionals in early childhood education, has been nominated as one of 16 such programs in the country for consideration as a "model" CDA training program.

One of 600 CDA training programs in the nation, the project was the only one nominated from Region 2 of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, which includes New York, New Jersey, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Program Coordinator Marie Ezell noted that six of the 16 programs nominated will be chosen to serve as model programs, and that materials describing the operation of those six will be distributed nationally as a basis for other child development training programs.

Those completing the training program with positive assessments receive the CDA credential from the Child Development Consortium in Washington, D.C. Participants may also further their studies through the University Without Walls program.

Certified CDAs are recognized nationally as qualified to teach preschool children and to work with their parents.

Skidmore's Child Development Center, directed by Florence Thompson, serves as a laboratory for the CDA program.

Operated by the University Without Walls Program, the CDA project trains professionals working in Head Start programs in the eight-county region surrounding the Capital District. The program involves on-site training and workshops in various aspects of child development.

UWW Receives Grants

Grant renewals totaling \$86,815 have been received by the University Without Walls Program for support of educational programs for law enforcement personnel, prison inmates, and child development professionals, it has been announced by Donald J. McCormack, UWW director.

The law enforcement personnel program, administered by Dr. Robert VanMeter, has received \$14,000 from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration. Seventeen students are currently participating in the program, which is designed for law enforcement personnel who wish to continue their education on the college level. Those who complete their studies receive the Bachelor of Science degree in law enforcement administration from Skidmore.

The Higher Education Opportunity Program has issued a \$45,414 grant to

Skidmore's Great Meadow Prison Program, which provides college opportunities to inmates at the Great Meadow Correctional Facility. The program, coordinated by Dr. Joseph Bruchac, has an enrollment of 81 students at the prison and four students on campus.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Office of Human Development, Children, Family and Youth Division, has awarded a grant of \$27,300 to the UWW Child Development Associate Program. Coordinated by Marie Ezell, the CDA program trains professionals working in child development and qualifies them for a national CDA credential, also giving them the option of pursuing a B.S. degree in early childhood education through a tuition assistance program. Some 11 child development professionals are currently enrolled in the program.

Challenge to the Class of '83

"We do not have the luxury of saying No"

Mellon Visiting Professor Benjamin Berry was the principal speaker for fall convocation.

Addressing the freshmen, he recounted the story of the early prophet Elijah, who, having angered Jezebel, King Ahob's wife, was fleeing for his life. When he sought shelter in a cave on Mount Aoreb, he encountered God who asked him "What Are You Doing Here?" To Elijah it was logical - he was escaping his personal situation and world situation as he perceived it.

Then Professor Berry related the story to a recent survey of 200,000 freshmen: "The picture that emerges from this mass data is of an 18 year old who is a job-oriented, parochial, self-centered, conservative student who, in the words of one counselor, seems to see education as a kind of 20th century alchemy, turning dross into gold and enhancing his commercial value. The typical freshman, if there is such a beast, would state simply that he or she is here to gain that stamp of social approval which leads to a better job."

Berry likened the freshmen to Elijah - freshmen reflecting society with its eyes firmly inward and its feet planted squarely in the middle of the road.

A Challenge

"... the purpose of a place like Skidmore", Berry said, "is to challenge . . . calf paths of the mind. This is a place in which ideas are valued and the life of the mind is cultivated. It is not a place for escape, an extended winter vacation complete with riding stables and ski trails. . . this community cannot be content to hide in the stacks of the library or the caves of Saratoga's drinking halls, . . . we cannot allow those who enter here to leave viewing the world through the same spectacles with which they came."

The struggle to be in a place in which ideas are valuable and the life of the mind is cultivated is one that must be waged daily and demands the active involvement of the entire community, he concluded "It is to that struggle that we are called. Like Elijah, we do not have the luxury of saying No."

Open House in New York City

Prospective students of nursing will have an opportunity to see at first hand our New York facilities when the Nursing Department holds its annual open house on November 10.

Scheduled for 1:30 p.m. in the Nurses Residence and Education Building at 325 E. 38th Street, the program will include a tour of the residence building

and of New York University Hospital (where our students are in clinical practice) and Library. Faculty and student panelists from first and second-year clinical practice will talk about the program, curriculum, and student life in the City.

Books

Censorship in Russia, 1865 - 1905 by Daniel Balmuth. University Press of America, Washington, D.C., 1979, 264 p. \$9.75

Professor of History Daniel Balmuth is the author of this book - a history of censorship policies and practices until the abolition of the censorship in 1905 and the establishment of a free press, which was to last until the Bolsheviks took over in 1917. Among the questions discussed are: Why were censors so lenient in their treatment of politically radical works? How and why did censors and writers cooperate to permit the expression of diverse political and social views in print? Why was the government reluctant to turn over cases of press crimes to the courts?

In researching this book, Dr. Balmuth, a specialist in Russian history, traveled to Finland, where he worked at the Helsinki library on a Fulbright, and again on an IREX travel grant. In this country he worked at the Harvard University Russian Research Center, in Widener and other libraries.

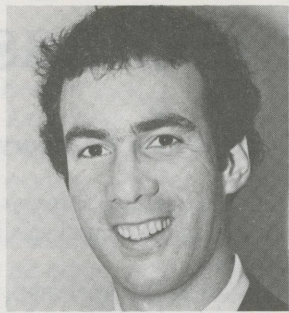

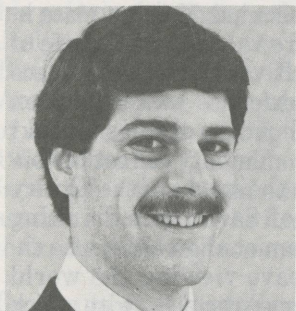

The women's tennis team, coached by Jeff Segrave, swung into its new season determined to match last year's record of 8-2, when they lost only to Colgate and Middlebury. They showed in the finals of both singles and doubles in the Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament at Princeton and the Northeastern Conference. To date their fall record is 9 wins, 1 loss.

Men's soccer, under Coach Kim Vieira, was very strong last year with a 7-3-1 record. This year, with the largest freshman team ever, Vieira expects to see a lot of playing time. Captain Mustapha Debboun '80 of Tangier, Morocco, is the only senior on the team. Oskar Ibru '81 of Apapa, Lagos, Nigeria has been top fullback for the past two years. They now have 4 wins, 1 loss, 1 tie.

Under Coach Donald Chu, the women's soccer, in its second season, will play Williams, Vassar, Colgate, Cornell, Siena and RPI. Co-captains are Phyllis Ingram '82 of Orangeburg, N.Y. and Mary Passaretti '80 of Saratoga Springs.

It is the fifth season for Skidmore Polo which launched its season at the University of Connecticut in Storrs. Team Captains this year are Skidmore's first four-year players: Collette Reifers '80 of Canaan, Ct. for the women's team and Andrew Philbrick '80 of Concord, N.H. for the men's team. They have respectively three and two year's experience in the captain's position.

Women's volleyball has as its captains Lane Riker '80, Warwick, R.I., and Pam Mikulewicz '80, Clarence, N.Y. Coaches Kim Vieira and Sinan Ceylan have volunteered their services to this dedicated and determined group who have practiced seven days a week since school opened to make a good showing in their first season. Their record to date: 8 wins, 1 loss.

Coming events include Skidmore College Women's Field Hockey team hosting the "A" division of the North East College Field Hockey Association (NECFHA) Tournament on October 27-28. Approximately 16 college teams will be participating in the two-day tournament, each team playing a total of three games.

"The strongest of all needs is the spirit of the institution. Hurricanes can blow buildings down but not bend the spirit. The spirit of the 80's is you," he concluded.
