## Liberal Arts Invade the Locker Room



Athletic Director Tim Brown finds sports enthusiasm high among liberal arts students. For collegiate athletics, these are the best of times and the worst of times. That contradiction is reality for two distinct and separate worlds of college sports.

One world is big-time college athletics, a world dominated by large institutions which often become better known for their football and basketball teams than for the educational programs that justify those teams' existence. It is a world revolving around intense competition, big money from gate receipts and television contracts, and constant pressure on athletes and coaches. It may be athletics, but is also big business. As an entertainment industry it touches millions of people and creates instant superstars; as a business it can destroy people who become mired in recruiting violations, point-shaving scandals and academic record-fixing in efforts to deal with the pressure. For those it is the worst of times.

For institutions which manage to

keep college athletics in perspective, it is the best of times. Student interest in recreational and competitive sport has grown to an unprecedented zenith, and the results have been an accompanying interest in physical fitness, overall "wellness," and the positive effects sport as a life-long pursuit can have on the amateur athlete.

It is in the climate of this world, which is still growing and changing, that Skidmore is revamping its approach to sports and physical education. The two most visible symbols of the overhaul are the new sports and recreation building currently being planned and a new academic administrator who last year became Skidmore's first athletic director/physical education-dance department chairperson.

Dr. Timothy Brown, formerly a professor and administrator with the University of Delaware, arrived at Skidmore last summer with a firm conviction about the relationship between the college and its athletic department.

"Sports should be an integral part of each student's educational program here," says Brown. "It should remain within the educational philosophy, not to be overemphasized or undertaken at the expense of other college experiences. It should be a meaningful part of all students' experience here, just as meaningful as their English, history or chemistry classes. I would like to see everyone have a positive sports experience at whatever level he or she chooses, whether it be an activity class, intramurals, club or intercollegiate competition."

Brown also recognizes that Skidmore's change in approach was in direct response to changing student demand for sports and recreation activities, an approach that fits quite comfortably with his philosophy that all decisions on athletics should be made with the student in mind.

That changing demand and the most appropriate response to it were the subjects of two years of study by the college Committee on Sports Programs, a body of students, faculty and administrators which examined various athletic department structures and eventually decided upon a joint athletic director/ P.E. chairperson reporting to the Dean of the Faculty.

Brown strongly maintains that this is the only structure that makes sense. "It's a big mistake to have an athletic department that's not part of the academic program. If it's not part of an

academic program, what's it doing at a college or university? Our thrust at colleges is education, so if you say athletics are different, are outside the educational program, then they don't belong at the college."

Even though the structural change is new and the policies of the person holding the position are still sinking in, the perception of Skidmore athletics has changed markedly both on campus

An action Brown took that captured the immediate attention of many in the local community was the hiring of Damian Fantauzzi as men's basketball coach.

Fantauzzi, for those who do not read the Capital District newspaper accounts of high school basketball, had been the extremely successful coach of the Saratoga Springs High School team which annually made both playoffs and headlines. His selection as the Skidmore coach was interpreted widely as a sign that the college, never known as a powerhouse in any sport, was about to take the whole matter of intercollegiate competition more seriously.

But Brown sees that appointment strictly as a means of expanding the Skidmore sports program to better fit its liberal arts context and meeting Skidmore's reputation for outstanding instruction.

"Winning is not the criterion on which we are going to judge our programs," he maintains. "It doesn't indicate anything other than enjoyment among the athletes, and possibly better coaching that will give them better skills."

Although Fantauzzi and many other coaches are part-time employees, Brown hopes to move in the direction of fulltime coaches who will be better able to give students increased access and knowledge. "We've been able to select some part-time coaches who have the adequate background," he says. "We don't have coaches for all the sports, because

we have elected to go only with people we feel are qualified. We don't want to hire someone just to have a body there."

The whole subject of intercollegiate sports, despite the growth from four varsity teams to 22 in the last 10 years, is one Brown insists on keeping in the realm of the educational experience.

"We want to offer the experience of intercollegiate competition with the best possible instruction we can give."

"I don't see us headed toward NCAA Division 3 or the NAIA just for the sake of post-season play. The only reason would be to qualify for the appropriate level of competition," he says. "I don't think national post-season play is the perspective we want to pursue. We want to offer the experience of intercollegiate competition with the best possible instruction we can give, just as the college gets the best instruction available for an English, art or science

Along with the changes on the recreational and intercollegiate levels brought about by coeducation and the heightened interest in physical fitness, Brown has reacted to demands for change in the physical education major demands created by facility shortages and shifts in academic interest among the students.

The current facilities "do not allow P.E. majors to experience what they plan to do as a profession," so the construction of a new building will certainly boost interest in the major, according to Brown. Beyond that, changes can also be detected in the curricular winds as he strives to maintain the outstanding national reputation the department has established under Margaret Paulding and Beverly Becker.

"We will be adding new curricular options to update the program," Brown says. "Athletic training is one, in the area of sports medicine. Exercise science is another. As we make those adjustments, I think we'll see numbers of students continue to enroll as physical education majors."

Brown predicts that the new sports and recreation facility will live up to its current billing as top priority among college building needs. He expects a tremendous, highly positive, and instantaneous impact on the Skidmore students, whether they plan a daily swim or a weekly pickup volleyball

"Right now we can carry on only one activity at a time," he points out. "The new facility will allow us to have an intramural program, and it will allow our teams to practice at reasonable times for intercollegiate contests. Now, for example, the men's basketball team sometimes has to practice from 9 to 11 at night. Four to 6 in the afternoon would be much more reasonable, and less of an intrusion on their study time."

Planning for the new building has reached the detailed stages, as Brown, the members of his department and other key people on campus hammer out the precise facilities to be included. Current plans call for a competitionsized swimming pool; a large multipurpose area for basketball, tennis, volleyball, and other indoor team sports; racquetball and squash courts; weight training and conditioning rooms; a sports training physiology lab; and faculty offices, which will bring the physical education and dance faculty together from their present scattering around the campus.

The timing of the new facility is a subject of virtual unanimity among faculty, administrators and, especially, students. The consensus is to build immediately, if not sooner, for the benefit of both current students and prospective students faced with the choice between Skidmore and other institutions with complete sports facilities. In the words of one student leader, "You just tell us when you're going to break ground, and we'll get that hole dug in a hurry.

Since no Skidmore construction project can begin without a specific number of dollars in hand and the rest "in sight," the exact timing for the structure's groundbreaking is unknown. The best estimates, however, are that construction will begin sometime this spring with a target date for completion 14 to 16 months later.

Meanwhile, Tim Brown intends to continue the alterations, additions and general fine tuning needed for the athletic program best suited for the

"The concept of lifelong sports is very real and very permanent," he says. "When you consider the enjoyment of sports, the fitness that goes along with them, and the outlet for the normal stress of life they provide, you can see the value of athletics as a lifelong pursuit. And the opportunity sports provide for interaction among people is equally important.

"We want to fit it in with the liberal arts philosophy. We want people to come here and have a multiple of very significant experiences, in the humanities, the sciences and, I hope, in sports."

# Books by Skidmore Authors



Miriam Benkovitz

On February 9, G.P. Putnam's Sons gave a reception at the Gotham Book Mart in New York City to honor Miriam Benkovitz, emerita professor of English, on the publication of her new book on Aubrey Beardsley.

Since turning from her 18th century studies to writing a first biography — "just to see if I could," she says — Miriam Benkovitz has produced three biographies. Her choice of subjects comes from a period she enjoys researching.

The turn of the century has a special fascination for her, and she collects first and special editions, letters, notebooks, memoirs and manuscripts of 20th century authors and artists.

Her first two biographies dealt with flamboyant and eccentric English characters. Ronald Firbank A Biography appeared in 1970 and Frederick Rolfe: Baron Corvo in 1978. Both received front-page reviews in the New York Times Book Review.

Aubrey Beardsley, An Account of His Life

By Miriam J. Benkovitz New York: G.P. Putnam's Sons, 1981. 228 pp. \$11.95 (and in London by Hamish Hamilton, Ltd.)

In Aubrey Beardsley, Miriam Benkovitz turns to an extraordinary genius, one of the greatest modern illustrators, whose life and work inspired legend. Flamboyant, young and self taught, he reached the pinnacle of professional success in his early twenties and died tragically young before he was twenty-six.

Now Miriam Benkovitz takes a fresh look at a man whose character still remains controversial, some seeing in him great saintliness, others great evil.

As she notes in her foreword, Beardsley and his work were often discussed in newspapers and journals during his lifetime, and by his numerous acquaintances after his death. She attributes much of this to his ability as an artist and to his associations with the best that was known and thought in his

In his hundreds of notes and letters, Beardsley wrote almost nothing intimate and in almost none did he openly and uncompromisingly delineate himself, the author says. The brevity of his life further precluded definitive judgments

In attempting to evaluate Beardsley's character, she has used his letters supplemented by autograph letters to and about him. Reproductions of his work and portraits of his associates are integrated throughout the text and the author catalogs his chief drawings.

Miriam Benkovitz paints a fascinating picture of Beardsley's family and of the circle to which his brilliance, charm and impressive portfolio gave him access. It included, among others, Sir Edward

In/Stability
The Shape and Space of Claudel's Art
Criticism
Studies in the Fine Arts: Criticism No. 4

Paul Claudel is best remembered as a dramatist, an ambassador and a poet. Rarely is he thought of as an art critic, and few critics have dealt with his art criticism, or, if they have, the studies are limited to his interest in one country.

In *In/Stability*, Lynne Gelber considers the entire body of Claudel's art criticism, showing how he used art criticism as a natural means of fusing the world of letters with the world of art.

Dr. Gelber has had a long-time interest in Claudel. *In/Stability* was originally presented as her doctoral thesis. Because it represented the first such comprehensive study and analysis of Claudel's art criticism, the UMI Research Press chose to publish it as one of its Studies in the Fine Arts Series.

From his early years, Claudel was drawn by his nature and training to arts and letters as interpretations of time, space, being and direction.

Dr. Gelber traces Claudel's art criticism, from his first essays, and analyzes its development through his experience of Oriental art and philosophy. She supports her thesis with abundant quotations from Claudel's essays.

Claudel's diplomatic duties in the consular service in China (1895-1905) and as ambassador to Japan (1921-27) enriched his critical views. He went to China at a time when the art of China was poorly regarded in France, and he enlightened the world on its abstract conceptions. His descriptions reflect his readings in Chinese philosophy which revealed to him the Chinese thought patterns and conceptions of time and space. He called their Taoism a "kind of glorification of the void," expressing the ultimate problems of time and space, both in literature and in art. Chinese calligraphy and architecture reinforced his interest in the relationship of space to movement.

The primary importance of his Eastern experience, then, is the extension of general concepts about space to specific painters in whom he saw new use of old elements, new use of traditional relationships of space and new techniques of light and colorings. Painting offered the visible demonstration of the coexistence of permanence and movement (a concept termed "In/Stability"), which Claudel's later essays and plays demonstrate as well.

Claudel thoroughly and consistently embodied seemingly disparate sources in a unified and critical approach to the art of time and place in his essays ranging from Gothic art through 17th

A Road Not Taken: The Editorial Opinions of Frederick C. Thorne. Edited by T.S. Krawiec Brandon, Vt.: Clinical Psychology Publishing Co., Inc. 1981. 296 pp. \$11.95.

Frederick C. Thorne was what his widow, Eleanor C. Thorne, calls, in her foreword, a "professional individualist." Trained in both psychology and psychiatry, his dream was to be a link between the two fields. After practicing psychiatry for many years, he returned to psychology and founded the *Journal of Clinical Psychology*. It was there, in his editorial opinions, that he left his most permanent record.

In A Road Not Taken, these editorials have been gathered together as a memorial to Frederick Thorne. The book's editor, T.S. Krawiec, emeritus professor of psychology, introduces these essays with an unedited taped interview he conducted with Thorne on June 25, 1973, in which they discussed Thorne's early education, parental influences, teachers' influences and theoretical views.

The book represents four decades of Thorne's attempt to clarify what he saw as his major intellectual challenge: to discover the great natural truths about behavior and to note how they can be put into practical use. The result is a central theory of psychology, eclectic in scope, dealing with psychological states, and culminating in a state theory.

"To continue to struggle after Truth," Krawiec says, is Frederick Thorne's bequest to the reader.

Chairman of Skidmore's department of psychology for 23 years, T.S. Krawiec received the American Psychological Association's Distinguished Teaching Award in 1971. His publications include Beginning Psychology: The Psychologists, Vol. I and Vol II, both published by the Oxford University Press in 1972 and 1974, and a third volume published in 1978 by the Clinical Psychology Publishing Company. As a supplement and complement to these volumes, Krawiec has taped over 60 distinguished psychologists.

century Spanish, Dutch and Flemish paintings to the works of his contemporaries.

In a chapter on "Claudel and European Art" Gelber notes that in turning to Western art Claudel was attracted not to most of his contemporaries but to Rubens, Rembrandt and other painters of the 17th century. In Dutch paintings he saw an interest similar to Far Eastern artists — an assembly of space and horizon, a uniting with nature. In Dutch paintings he found the meaning and importance of time best explained. His pleasure in Flemish art was largely reserved for Rubens whose use of color to introduce movement and energy and whose use of drama he admired.

PL 94-142: An Act of Congress By Erwin L. Levine and Elizabeth M. Wexler New York: Macmillan, 1981. 214 pp. Paperback.

How does an idea become a law and how is the law then implemented by an agency of the federal government? *PL 94-142: An Act of Congress* answers this question.

Co-authored by Erwin Levine, professor of government and chair of the department, and Elizabeth Maiden Wexler (Newell) '68, the book was written to help the undergraduate student understand the relationship of federalism, separation of powers, interest groups, and the administrative agencies of both the state and federal governments and the state and federal governments.

ment to each other. Taking Public Law 94-142 (The Education for All Handicapped Children Act of 1975), a law that mandates that the states provide for a free appropriate public education for handicapped children, the authors examine in detail the organization of special interest and lobbying groups, the political activity of these groups and their relationship to Congress, and the relationship of Congress to the executive branch. The roles of the House and Senate in the formulation of a law and the role of the courts as an important adjunct to the political process are discussed. Stages in the drafting of a bill are outlined and the bill is followed through Committee hearings to its final passage.

The text features a unique treatment of Congressional Oversight with an entire chapter being devoted to the writing of federal regulations, in the context of Congressional intent of the law, and the funding and renewal of

legislation. Levine and Wexler write about a subject of special interest to both of them and of which they are knowledgeable. Prof. Levine, a specialist in American government, has a special interest in Congress and the Presidency. He coauthored An Introduction to American Government (now in its 4th edition) and published two books on Senator Theodore H. Green. Elizabeth Wexler, a government major while at Skidmore, has continued her interest and, in both her present and previous work, has had extensive experience in the activity of interest groups and their relationship to Congress.

PL 94-124: An Act of Congress is a text which will be useful in introductory courses on American government, courses on Congress and courses on both public policy and interest groups. It will be sold at college bookstores around the country.

## Winter Term Adventures — Off Campus

Come winter term, Skidmore students are known to do strange things... "strange," that is, in the sense of the new, the exciting, the unexpected, as they travel abroad or explore within, risk endeavors in fields outside their majors, journey through unfamiliar realms of thought, develop talents more fully or discover ones they never knew they had.

This January, approximately 300 students adventured off campus for the month, on independent study projects or alumni-sponsored internships, on travel seminars across (and even in one case, *under*) the sea.

#### **Travel Courses**

The ocean depths served as classroom and laboratory for students enrolled in "The Skills of Scuba Diving," taught by physical education instructor Kim Vieira. After two and a half weeks of spending three to four hours a day in the Saratoga Y pool (and two to three hours a day studying coral formations and the evolution of reefs), the class moved into open and warmer waters. For ten days in the Florida Keys, the divers tested their training and knowledge, descending deep into fresh-water caves and exploring the threatened coral reefs out in the open ocean.

In Crawley, England, a so-named "New Town" (although ancient in origins) created by urban designers to reflect in virtually every detail all aspects of English society, twelve Skidmore students moved into the homes of local families to observe close-up the English way of life. Guided by Skidmore Education Professor Leonard Braam, the students visited the Crawley schools, as well as schools and universities in many other parts of the country, for the purpose of comparing the English schools with American ones. Along the way, they also toured many of Britain's famous cultural and historical sights.

A group comprised of both studio art and art history students joined Skidmore art faculty members Peter Baruzzi and David Miller on a tour through Northern and Central Italy. Travelling to Milan, Venice, Padua, Florence, Pisa, Ravenna, Assisi and Rome, they experienced first-hand the treasure trove of art and architecture that only Italy offers: the cathedrals, palaces, frescoes, mosaics, fountains, sculptures, paintings — even the bridges and gardens — graced by the genius touch of such artists as da Vinci, Giotto, Cimabue, Botticelli, Michelangelo.

The artists of Provence, as well as its authors, its geographic wonders, its civilization dating back to Greek and Roman times, were explored by students who toured that part of France from Avignon to Marseilles, led by Skidmore Professor of Foreign Languages Anthony Nazzaro. Elisabeth Carroll, assistant professor of dance at Skidmore, took a group of Skidmore dance students to Monte Carlo. There, they engaged in a month's intensive study at the Academie de Danse Classique Princesse Grace, where Professor Carroll's own former teacher, Russianborn dancer Marika Besobrasova, directs the Academie.

#### **Alumni Interships**

Twenty-eight students took leave of college classrooms for the month to move into business and government offices, hospitals, schools, research laboratories, artists' studios, press rooms, art and auction galleries, and even the Pentagon. In whatever career area one could name, chances are, there's a Skidmore graduate there, and thanks to the Alumni Internship Program, current Skidmore undergraduates are joining them on the job.

Ann O'Keefe '83, from Averill Park, N.Y., is now a government major at Skidmore, although she started her college career as a cadet at the U.S. Air Force Academy. Ann knows her own reasons for choosing to change her plans, but this January she attempted to learn why large numbers of pilots (trained at a cost of around a million dollars each) are leaving the Air Force to work for private airlines. Her alumna supervisor at this task was Cecile Shure Landrum '63, a manpower analyst who serves as a Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Air Force.

Government major John Singer '83 took advantage of what he termed "a unique opportunity for a male to gain a different perspective" on the issue of abortion, as he joined alumna Sandra Colony Kelley '67, now Executive Director of the New York State office

On-campus students could odyssey too, among courses exploring topics that ranged as widely as from "The Ethics of Love" to the role of rats and fleas in human history.

Sea monsters, even, entered the picture, and quite literally so for students enrolled in a course called "Frauds and Hoaxes in Science," which explored, among other topics, the photographic evidence for the existence of "Nessie" (the Loch Ness monster) and "Champ," the creature supposedly lurking just up the road from Saratoga in Lake Champlain.

And who knows what evil lurks in the motives of Madison Avenue admen? Jean Kilbourne, a prominent media analyst, claims she does and presented her evidence in a slide show/lecture, "The Naked Truth: Advertising's Image of Women," an examination of specific ways advertisements reinforce stereotypes and affect self-images. Her presentation, scheduled in connection with two separate winter-term courses

— "A Social History of Advertising" and "Symbolic Annihilation: Women in the Mass Media" — was open to all and drew a packed house of both students and Saratogians.

Several other courses, too, scheduled events which drew community wide attendance:

An economics course examining Milton Friedman's controversial best-seller, Free to Choose, sponsored a talk by David Warsh, economics reporter for the Boston Globe, who claimed that money has little to do with the problem of inflation.

A course on the films of Alfred Hitchcock offered eleven examples of what course-instructor James Kiehl called the "wiggy, pseudo-Freudian, private psychology" and otherwise "wonderful fun" to be found in Hitchcock's movies.

More films, among them "Three Faces of Eve," "A Woman Under the Influence," Ingrid Bergman in "Gaslight," and "The Days of Wine and Roses" offered "Psychological Perspectives on Women's Lives" in a course by that title.

Rounding it up and bringing it all back home, students and teachers gathered together early in February for an all-day celebration of their winterterm adventures. This Winter Term Festival, sponsored by the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs, provided an exciting showcase for the students' winter term work, allowing all to share each other's varied and valuable experiences and sparking, no doubt, some new ideas for the Winter of '82.

In honor of Mozart's birthday, during winter term Skidmore music professors George Green and Edward Hausman, together with their special guests from the Schenectady Symphony, presented an all-Mozart concert in Filene Recital

Despite the fact that the temperature had barely climbed above zero by three o'clock on the afternoon of the concert, Mozart-lovers from miles around climbed into cars (that they prayed would start!) and came in enthusiastic crowds to be warmed by the lyric promise of spring that sings through Mozart's music. They also came because they knew the performance would be something special, for both Professor Green, violinist, and Professor Hausman,

pianist, are noted musicians whose reputations extend far beyond the college community. George Green has appeared at Carnegie Hall, performing (on solo violin and viola) works of his own composing, while Edward Hausman, a frequent recitalist locally as well as in New York City, has made international tours (including extended tours through Korea and Japan), both as a member of the First Piano Quartet and as a soloist.

The program — a violin-viola duet, the "Sinfonia Concertante for Violin, Viola and Piano" and the "Quartet for Oboe, Violin, Viola and Cello" — proved an effective showcase for the astounding talents of these two artists, as well as those of Ernest Horvath, viola, Rudolf Doblin, cello, and Gene Marie (Mrs. George) Green, whose serene virtuosity on oboe sent winter-weary spirits soaring to warm and grateful applause.

## "Angel City" on Skidmore Stage

Members of Theatre Research Associates (an independent group of theatre artists in residence at Skidmore College) performed in their own production of "Angel City," a zany fantasy

about Hollywood, the movies and the American West written by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Sam Shepard. Nine performances of their thoroughly professional production were staged at the Skidmore Theatre in January, with additional performances held by popular demand in February.

Three of the five members of TRA—David Laden, Tom Gustin and Arthur Marcus— are sharing a two-year teaching residency at Skidmore. The company was assisted in the staging of "Angel City" by a number of Skidmore students and alumni, among them: Ellen Kurrelmeyer '79 (now a graduate student of lighting and design at New York University), scenic and lighting design; Kathleen Dowley '84, stage manager; and Tod Greenfield '82, technical director. Other students assisted at box office, as electricians and on set and costume construction.

#### Student Art On Exhibit

Once a year, exclusive use of the college Art Gallery space is reserved for the best of student art works. From January 8 to February 8, gallery visitors were treated to a display of 68 works — paintings and drawings, sculptures and mixed-media constructions, prints and photographs, ceramic and jewelry pieces — chosen from among 250 entries.

Guest juror for the show, Dr. Paul D. Schweizer, director of the Munson-Williams-Proctor Institute in Utica, expressed high praise for the quality and creativity of works produced by Skidmore student artists.

Senior Andrea Hersh from Worcester, Massachusetts, received a first place award for her mixed-media entry, while second place honors went to her classmate Elizabeth King (from Woodbridge, Connecticut), for her large acrylic abstract painting. Sean Stewart '81 from Lake George, New York, won the third award for a still life rendered in gouache.

#### Washington Term off to Exciting Start

Five Skidmore students, all with government or government-related majors, are off to Washington, D.C., for the spring term, which promises to be an exciting one, starting off as it did with a Presidential Inauguration.

Phyllis Ingram, Patricia Miller, Victoria Vogel, Denise LaSorte (all of the class of '82) and Barbara Dugan '83 are all participating in Skidmore's Washington Semester Program at American University, a program that offers intensive on-the-job experience in government work along with classwork taken at the University. And joining them there on the scene are two more members of Skidmore's class of '82, Jane Harlow and Jennifer Lamson, both American studies majors enrolled in a similar program offered through American University.

Arriving in the nation's capital at a time of massive changeover in House and Senate, departments and agencies will certainly add a dimension to their experience, as the students take up their assignments for work, research and study.

## Winter Sports - Men and Women Take to Rink and Court


#### Men's Basketball

The winter sports season is in full swing and riding high on the momentum provided by a challenging new basketball coach, Damian Fantauzzi. The men's basketball team is proving just about unstoppable, with a win-loss record so far this year of 13-3: "the best showing ever in the brief history of men's basketball at Skidmore," according to Coach Fantauzzi. Athletic Director Tim Brown credits Fantauzzi for bringing new depth and breadth to Skidmore's basketball program, coming as he does from an immensely successful career in high school coaching.

The team proved a power to be reckoned with when Skidmore hosted RPI, St. Lawrence and Vassar for the second annual Skidmore Invitational Tournament. Rolling over St. Lawrence (79-69) in the opening round, Skidmore battled to a barn-burning second place against RPI in the championship game, which RPI took (78-76) by a single basket placed four seconds before the final buzzer. A few days later, Skidmore (despite having played 6 games in 12 days) narrowly missed pulling off one of the major upsets of the year when they lost by a mere 4 points (72-68) to talent-laden SUNY, New Paltz in the championship game of the New Paltz Invitational. Skidmore senior Dan Tallman took high scoring honors for the game with an impressive 37 points.

#### Men's Ice Hockey

Men's ice hockey also has a new coach this year, leading the team so far to overwhelming wins against Siena (15-6) and Herkimer (21-0). Dick Blais is the man in charge, and he brings to his job at Skidmore impressive powers acquired while playing Division I hockey himself at Oswego, where he also honed his coaching talents, serving as assistant coach.

#### Women's Ice Hockey

Skidmore Senior Steve Cornell, a leading player on the men's varsity ice hockey team, shares his skills by coaching the women's ice hockey team. Women's ice hockey!? Yes, indeed, the women are out on the ice (and in growing numbers) for the second year in a row at Skidmore, challenging teams from Hamilton, the University of Vermont, RPI, Williams and Middlebury. Thirty-five women tied on their skates this year to try out for this demanding sport, which calls for the same kind of speed, precision and stamina required by men's ice hockey, without the violent moves of body checking.

While many of the players have had previous ice hockey experience, most come to the sport with a figure-skating background. In her first year of playing ice hockey, freshman rookie goalie Rachel Finn from Newton, Massachusetts, has allowed only one puck into the net in the last two games, decisive victories against RPI (4-0) and Williams (3-1). On the offense, cocaptain Kathy Newell '83 from Dedham, Massachusetts, counts two hat tricks to her credit so far this season.

#### Women's Basketball

The Skidmore women's basketball team found its stride after dropping the first two games, to surge undefeated through the next eight games.

Led by senior forward Pam Lancaster from New London, Connecticut, who is averaging 18 points and 12 rebounds per game, the team stands second in the conference to date (with a 7-2 conference record, 11-6 overall) and is looking forward to making the conference tournament at the end of February.

From December 1973 to May 1975 she served as management associate, Executive Office of the President, Office of Management and Budget, serving as the principal liaison between members of the Presidential and White House staff and the top management of the Department of the Interior.

From May 1975 until December 1976 she served as assistant secretary, Administration and Finance, Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and from 1977 until taking her present post at Harvard University, she served as first deputy secretary of state for the Commonwealth.

Ms. Ramsay has held the academic post of lecturer — at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and at Harvard University — and has published numerous articles in professional journals on the topics of drug abuse, public health and women in management.

Presently a member of the board of directors, Urban League of Massachusetts, of the steering committee, National Business Council for the Equal Rights Amendment, and of the President's Advisory Committee for Women, Ms. Ramsay has also served on the President's Commission on White House Fellows and as chairman of the board of directors of the White House Fellows Foundation.

ing women the right to vote, was the next victory in the struggle, "and now," Ms. Ramsay said, "we are discussing the proposed 27th Amendment (the ERA), and face the same misconceptions, misrepresentations and ridicule" that have accompanied every effort along the way.

"Will this country have equal rights for women **under the law** in our lifetime? Ever?"

"Why do we have these problems with a gender-based amendment guaranteeing equality?" she queried. "Will this country have equal rights for women under the law in our lifetime? Ever?"

One of the major obstacles to ratification of the ERA, according to Ms. Ramsay, is that, although the women's rights movement has been going on for more than a hundred years, most people tend to think it began in the 1960's, with the abrasive, radical feminists grabbing media attention with their extremist stands on abortion and gay rights. As a result, feminism has come to be seen by many as anti-family, with opponents such as Phyllis Schlafly preaching that the ratification of the ERA will bring lesbianism, forced abortion, women in combat, women taking jobs away from men, joint public toilets, and so forth.

So many misconceptions have resulted, Ms. Ramsay stated, that it will require an all-out effort and, above all, time — perhaps a long time — to repair the damage, to educate the public to what she claimed are the genuine benefits the ERA would bring: correcting

Just five years ago Nelle Nugent '60 and Elizabeth McCann announced their partership as Broadway producers "McCann and Nugent." They are also the co-producers of *The Elephant Man's* phenomenally successful national tour and of Samm Art Williams' *Home*.

Recently they managed the Pulitzer Prize-winning *The Gin Game*, including its tour of the U.S.S.R. They have also managed the international tours of the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company, the Theatre de la Ville, The Renaud-Barrault Company and *Porgy and Bess*.

They are management consultants to the new Lincoln Center Company and general managers of the musical revue, *Tintypes*.

Nelle Nugent and Elizabeth McCann

are what is known as the new generation of Broadway producers, capable of supervising all aspects of production and advising the financially-responsible producer. Most of these new "general-managers" have risen through the ranks and are experienced in handling the actors, the union, promotion or publicity and the business side of production. Both Nugent and McCann came up through the ranks.

From her childhood days in New Jersey, Nelle Nugent wanted to be an actress, working in summer stock through high school and college. She was a teenager when she discovered the wonderful world of "backstage" and directed her efforts to what she does now with such perfection. Three weeks after graduation from Skidmore, with a major in theater arts, she was in summer stock and then stage-managing off Broadway.

To realize her ambition of getting to Broadway, Nugent became a production secretary and worked up to assistant

stage manager.

In 1971, when Nelle Nugent joined the Nederlander organization as associate managing director she began working with Liz McCann who was managing director for the organization. (McCann also came up through the ranks. She has an M.A. in English literature and a law degree.) Their fiveyear association marked a period of great expansion for the Nederlander organization. During this time they both found their strengths. McCann was good with actors and contracts, Nugent with technical details, or, as Nugent has been quoted as saying, "Liz takes the front of the house, and I take the back (the nuts and bolts)." Perfectionist by nature, Nelle Nugent has been seen on hands and knees before the first curtain, insuring every detail is

Nelle and Liz founded their agency in 1976 with an initial investment of \$1600 each. In 1980 their box-office gross from the plays they produced was

inequities concerning Social Security benefits, property ownership and inheritance laws, the value of housewives' work and many other areas.

"Feminism is not a disease; it is a recognition of the status of women coupled with a desire to do something about that status."

"Feminism is not a disease," Ms. Ramsay stated, "but a recognition of the status of women coupled with a desire to do something about that status." She cited a recent national poll which indicated that over 60 million women and almost 70% of the total population favor passage of the ERA. Three more states must ratify the proposed amendment before it can become law, and in less than a year and a half the Congressional extension for ratification will end. If those three states do not ratify - Ms. Ramsay pointed out that one of those states (Mississippi) has not yet ratified the 19th Amendment, "as a symbol of their opinion" — what then?

"We will have to find a legally acceptable way to begin again," she chal-

lenged, predicting that it may take another 10 or 20 years or more for the proposed amendment to become law.

There were no time frames nor deadlines in effect for some of our most important Constitutional amendments, she pointed out, adding that "to be knocked out of the running for purposes of Congressional convenience . . . is an insult to our intelligence and to the principles upon which this country was founded."

"The efforts to achieve an Equal Rights Amendment will take no less time or frustration," Ms. Ramsay concluded, "than the thirteenth or the nineteenth. It will not occur without a long, tortuous, sometimes well-reasoned, finely tempered discussion dragged out over a century of lives, courts, legislatures and Congresses."

might not have come along for quite awhile, even then, if it hadn't happened that some influential men pointed out that these abolitionist women had no right to speak in public against slavery (or any other issue, for that matter) since they had no right to vote, did not own property, by and large, and in any case their opinions were of little value. Naturally, very few women (and men) who opposed slavery took this sitting down." The real issue at stake was rights, period: "Men's rights. Women's rights. Inequities. #### Children's Advocate Assumes Top Post

Joyce Macwatty Black '48 (Mrs. Hiram D.) was recently elected president of the Board of Directors of the Child Welfare League of America, a federation of 400 of the leading child welfare agencies in the U.S. and Canada.

A member of the CWLA since 1975 and chairperson of its Public Policy Committee, she has been an active children's advocate testifying frequently before House and Senate committees.

Mrs. Black is credited with having played an important part in the passage of HR 3434, which for five years was the League's top national legislative priority, and which became Public Law 96-272 over President Carter's signature on June 17, 1980. This new child welfare reform act is recognized as a significant advance for deprived children in the United States, particularly the developmentally disabled.

Mrs. Black's interests are extensive, focusing on children. She is president of the Day Care Council of New York and a member of the Board of the New York State Council of Voluntary Child Care

Agencies.



#### **Aubrey Beardsley**

Burne-Jones, Max Beerbohm, Sir William Rothenstein, and Oscar Wilde.

Dr. Benkovitz traces the progress of Beardsley's career as an illustrator. Inspired by his readings and his love of fantasy, much of his early drawing was caricature, comic in its exaggeration. By the age of sixteen, when he went up to London — where the museums, gallerys, shops and streets became his school — he had added the grotesque.

His first major commission, to make drawings for an edition of *Morte Darthur*, came in 1893 from J.P. Dent. There followed the illustrations for Wilde's *Salome*, which, in the public's mind, unfortunately, coupled him with Wilde's offenses.

In 1894 his illustrations for *The Yellow Book*, which he created with his American friend Henry Harland and publisher John Lane, brought him to the pinnacle of success. For a year he enjoyed fame and notoriety. Victorian sensitivities centered on the magazine when Wilde was arrested, and Beardsley was dismissed as art editor.

The evil attributed to Beardsley was obviously related to the sexual content of his drawings (exemplified in his romantic novel *Venus and Tannhauser*), his literary association with Oscar Wilde

(whom he disliked) and conjectures about his incestuous relationship with his sister. Thousands and thousands of words have been written about this "supposititious" relationship, the author says, yet there is not one word of proof. However, his near obsession with sex has earned him a place in the circle of The Decadents, she suggests.

#### In/Stability

Among the Spanish, Velasquez was the painter he most appreciated, considering him a master of the intricacies of light and color playing on the forms of nature and in whose paintings he saw a symbolic, intellectual use of external reality.

Although Claudel had a powerful distaste for some painters, including Picasso, he was as universal in his interests and judgments as he was rigorous in intellectual discipline, Dr. Gelber points out.

Lynne Gelber's *In/Stability* shows Claudel as a critic of considerable stature and originality and should, as the publisher suggests, expand his audience and play a role in restoring him to his deserved place in the history of 20th-century art criticism.

Lynne Gelber, an associate professor of French, chairs the department of foreign languages and literatures at Skidmore.

\$14,326,857, according to a recent *New York Times* article.

As producers, the two are known for their concern for their investors, keeping them informed, handling money with care and giving attention to detail to insure efficiency.

An important part of producing a successful Broadway show, of course, is choosing the right production. To do this requires miles and miles of travel and hours of viewing productions — in Toronto, Cincinnati, San Francisco — or in England. Before negotiating to produce *Amadeus*, *Piaf* or *Rose*, for example, Nelle Nugent spent some days in London seeing plays.

Summer stock is another source for McCann and Nugent. Morning's at Seven is an example. When Vivian Matalon revived it in Chicago, Nelle Nugent accepted his invitation to see the play and came back to New York determined to produce it, although neither the original 1939 version nor the 1955 revival had been successful. They shifted the play's timing from the '30's to a more golden period of America, 1923-24, and changed the accent from a gentle, sweet play about old people to a play about a family and its inner feelings

and frustrations and conflicts. The result was a successful production.

Instinct, temperament and tenacity, managerial skills and hard work underlie successes such as this.

As to the future? Nelle Nugent and Elizabeth McCann see their role as catalysts — expanding theater audiences and upgrading Broadway theater. Nelle Nugent recently expressed concern about the rising prices of legitimate theater tickets which are beginning to keep away the fixed-income theatergoer. People on retirement pensions can't keep up with them. The result, she notes, will be an increase in the 35-50 audience which, in turn, will change the nature of shows. She and Elizabeth McCann have thought of restructuring ticket prices and of forming a repertory company to meet some of the problems they foresee. And, given their record, they undoubtedly will come up with some positive solution.

McCann and Nugent are not forecasting their future successes. Their attitude as summed up by Nelle Nugent, has always been, "when the curtain goes up on opening night, we want to be able to say it was the best we could

do."
