






Expanding the Circles of Friendship SKIDMORE'S JUNIOR YEAR ABROAD

For scores of Skidmore students, the world has become a much smaller place in the last few years. Since 1979, when Skidmore first established its Junior Year Abroad programs, over 100 students have spent all or half of their junior years in either Paris, France, or Barcelona, Spain. The programs, designed and administered by a faculty committee drawn from the art, business, theater, foreign languages, government and history departments, are coordinated by Dr. Lynne Gelber, chair of the department of foreign languages and literatures at Skidmore College.

"We believe experiences abroad are a way to help our students understand world views in other cultures," Gelber said recently, as she sat beneath the enormous map of the Paris Metro system that dominates one wall of her office in Palamountain Hall. Like most foreign study programs, she explained, a staple of Skidmore's program is classroom study in either French or Spanish, including core courses which explore the living language and contemporary civilization in the country the students have chosen. Skidmore students may also select from literally hundreds of other courses in the accessible institutions in Paris and Barcelona, enriching and augmenting the academic component of their residencies at the Sorbonne or the University of Barcelona.

But what distinguishes Skidmore's program, Gelber emphasized, is that it does not merely transplant its students to foreign soil for academic study: "We help our students get inside the circles of friendships and experiences built by other people in other cultures. We equip our students to understand and enter those circles."

To immerse participants totally in the flavor and character of the host country, they are housed not in dormitories, but in homes with French or Spanish natives who do not necessarily speak English. Skidmore students are integrated into the family and social environments of their hosts, thereby acquainting them firsthand with those cultural and linguistic idioms that truly break down the barriers of the "circles" in Gelber's metaphor.

The directors and coordinators of Skidmore's Junior Year Abroad program work closely with full-time liaison staff in residence overseas, carefully tailoring the experience to support the needs and interests of each individual student. This liaison staff — each of whom is thoroughly familiar both with the foreign culture and with Skidmore — includes academic directors Norman Stokle in Paris and Joan P. Berenguer in Spain. Also in Paris, Molly Koebel Delaunay '74 serves as housing coordinator in charge of matching candidates with their host families. All three travel to Saratoga Springs each year to interview and prepare students for their programs and to introduce themselves as the crucial link students will have to Skidmore during their tenures abroad.

Typical of the Skidmore way of doing things, the student is more than a paper applicant to the staff. For example, upon Delaunay's return to France, she is able to prepare hosts with special insights into the visitors who will share their living quarters for many months. Questions ranging from eating habits to personality traits are posed to collect as many details as possible in this sensitive decision.

"The housing coordinator is very important to the program; she knows the college and she understands the students," Gelber said. "She orients them and the host families about the kinds of social expectations which might otherwise be confusing. For instance, in France, nobody uses the telephone to chat, only to make appointments. The French are letter writers. Molly tells students about this custom so they won't upset the French families whose telephones they use. On the other side, she warns French people that many Americans expect to take a shower every single morning. There's a different sense of personal space and privacy among the French than there is here. These things make a big difference to students' comfort once they're over there."

Internships comprise another unusual opportunity for Skidmore students in Europe, offering the ultimate integrating experience in a foreign culture — a part-time work experience that exposes them to the social world of their peers and, moreover, to those whose concerns lie beyond the academic experience. But the internships are nevertheless designed to complement the academic experience. For example, Skidmore students are currently involved in such activities as: conservation work at the Musee Carnavalet for an art history major; banking for a business-French major; assistance in a law office for a government-Spanish major; teaching English for several Spanish and French majors; stage management at the Cafe Theatre Beaubourgeois for a French-theater major; counseling on an English-language hotline in Paris for a psychology major; and work in a private atelier for an art major.

The students' response to the programs is best articulated in their own words. In a recent essay sent from Paris, juniors Gabrielle Fath and Elisabeth Dunbar observed: "Our housing situation isn't exactly dormitory life. In fact, it's more like living in Albany. You can't roll out of bed five minutes before your 8:30 class. We all have metro rides of a half hour to 45 minutes to get from apartments to the universities. Most of us are living in family situations complete with father, mother and kids. Some of us are with a single woman or a middle-aged couple. Mme. Delaunay placed each of us in environments suited to our personalities. The main purpose of this type of housing is to immerse each of us totally into the French language and culture. What better way than to live, eat and converse with a family that speaks no English?"

Students enrolled in Dr. Stokle's course in contemporary French society observe that their coursework transcends classroom study: "This broad topic covers the social and political institutions of France and the French system of values. It is designed to make us push aside our American ways and really try to understand the French way of life. One of our first assignments was to compare small, often family-owned specialty stores to 'supermarkets,' stores similar to American supermarkets. We interviewed employees and customers, noting their attitudes toward the different types of stores. After much investigation on the topic, we pre-

Three in English Earn NEH Research Support

Three Skidmore College English professors have been chosen from 750 applicants to receive grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities' Fellowship for College Teachers Program.

Dr. Terence E. Diggory, assistant professor, Dr. Charlotte Goodman, associate professor, and Dr. Jennie Skerl, assistant professor, will use the grants for research and writing projects to be undertaken within the next year.

Diggory, who joined the English department in 1977, will research "The Iconic Poem in Contemporary Verse." English language poems written since World War II will serve as the foundation for his study of poetry that uses a work of art as its subject.

In an effort to summarize 20th-century contributions in this area, Diggory will embrace a critical and historical perspective by "analyzing particular poems for the relationship to graphic art that they and other statements by their authors suggest."

A 1973 Yale University graduate, Diggory will return to his alma mater to use its library and art collection in his research. He also will visit New York's Metropolitan Museum and the Museum of Modern Art in order to view the paintings related to the work of a number of major poets.

Diggory has set a summer 1985 deadline for completion of his study, which Princeton University Press has expressed an interest in publishing.

Charlotte Goodman, also, will work on a book-length study: a critical biography of Pulitzer Prize-winning author Jean Stafford.

A specialist in American literature who holds degrees from Wellesley, Harvard and Brandeis, Dr. Goodman has been involved in a continuing effort to incorporate women writers into the literature curriculum. She has taught at Skidmore for a decade.

In her NEH proposal Dr. Goodman maintains that "despite the fact that Jean Stafford was acknowledged as a first-rate writer, her work, surprisingly, has received little serious critical attention. Furthermore, the only biographical accounts of her life to appear in print have been incorporated into studies of other writers, including biographies of her first husband, American poet Robert Lowell, and her third husband, *New Yorker* writer A.J. Liebling."

Dr. Goodman expects to spend another year on research, using the time to travel to the University of Colorado in Boulder (site of Stafford's archive) and to the Houghton Library in Cambridge, location of the Stafford-Lowell correspondence. Also planned are interviews with friends and neighbors of the late author, including Louis Auchincloss, Mary McCarthy, Elizabeth Hardwick and Howard Moss.

The effect of the Moroccan environment on a group of avant-garde authors is one of several subjects to be explored in Dr. Jennie Skerl's project, titled "American Expatriate Writers in Tangier." The book-length study will be a literary history of three writers, Paul Bowles, Jane Bowles and William S. Burroughs, who lived in Tangier after World War II.

Dr. Skerl contends that these writers, while different on the surface, shared similar attitudes about their art that led them to Tangier as the ideal environment for social and artistic experimentation. She will detail the influence of their exile on their writing and individual creativity.

The year-long study will include a trip to Tangier as well as visits to academic libraries in the Northeast.

A Skidmore faculty member since 1981, Dr. Skerl has earned two faculty research grants. She is a graduate of Western Reserve University, the University of Wisconsin and Kent State University.

Record Numbers Choose Skidmore First

Kent Jones, Skidmore's director of admissions, announced recently that the number of prospective freshmen applying for admission to the college under the early decision program is at an all-time high. The early decision program is designed to accommodate candidates for whom Skidmore is a first choice by providing them with an immediate response to their applications if submitted by December 15th. While students are free to apply to other colleges while seeking consideration at Skidmore under this plan, it is understood that they will withdraw those other applications if accepted to the college.

This year's early decision group reflects a 22 percent increase over the 1981-82 group (the largest number of early decision

applicants prior to this year) and an increase of more than three-and-one-half times the number of early decision applications received in 1977-78.

This good news reinforces Jones's belief that Skidmore is becoming increasingly attractive to high school seniors. With the alarming decline in the number of eighteen-year-olds graduating from high school, especially in the northeastern United States from which Skidmore draws approximately 75 percent of its applicants, this trend is encouraging. With 20 percent of the class of 1988 enrolled under the early decision program (the largest percentage in Skidmore's history), the future looks bright for a highly qualified and enthusiastic group of freshmen enrolling next September.

People and Projects

These items about students, faculty and staff were selected to indicate some of the impact Skidmore people are having on the world beyond the campus.

Barry Goldensohn, department of English, has had four recent poems accepted for publication. Three will appear in *Poetry* and one will be published in *Ploughshares*.

Leo Geoffrion, Computer Services, has developed a computer-based communication program that enables severely speech-handicapped people to communicate audibly, using a synthetic speech device. The device, combining an Apple Computer, a VOTRAX Speech Synthesizer and a printer, had its debut last summer when a young cerebral palsy victim used it to make the first telephone call of his life — to a pizza shop to order a pizza delivered. The device is now in regular use at special education centers around the Northeast.

Anthony Holland, department of music, has received word that his concerto for piccolo and chamber orchestra will have its premiere performance with the Central Washington University Orchestra in Ellensburg, Wash. The work will be a featured piece in a three-day Festival of Contemporary Music at the University. Well-known composers Warren Benson of the Eastman School of Music and Donald White, an innovative band music composer, also will have their selections performed during the festival. Holland will attend the event and coach the orchestra in its final rehearsals of his concerto in February.

Kenneth G. Johnson, department of geology, has been chosen to be a member of a 15-person American Association of Petroleum Geologists delegation which has been invited by the government of the People's Republic of China to participate in a bilateral technical exchange with Chinese specialists in petroleum exploration.

Richard J. Linke, department of art, has received a grant from Polaroid Corporation's Worldwide Creative Services Division for work on his Adirondack landscapes. He has just completed an Adirondack Museum commission to

produce a 30-foot square photographic mural for the facility's new mining building. A 1983 series of his aerial photographs is on permanent display at the museum. Linke has more than 40 photographs in the book *House Warming*, published this year by Adirondack Alternate Energy. In addition, the August 1983 edition of *House Beautiful* magazine used his photographs to accompany an article on "Great Camps."

Sophomore tennis players **Valerie Alliger** (Melville, N.Y.) and **Roxanne Felton** (Swanzey Center, N.H.) were named to the 1983 New York State Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (NYSIAW) Division III All-State team. This is the first year the association has given such recognition. Both players were members of Skidmore's 1982 NYSIAW and Eastern AIAW championship teams.

SKIDMORE AND SARATOGA COMMUNITIES JOIN IN A MUTUAL TRIBUTE

"Some institutions are truly the shadows of individuals, and the Adirondack Trust Company is fortunate to be numbered in their company . . . Pete (Wait) both served the community by causing its bank to be quick, decisive, and creative in serving community needs, and served the bank by giving the community's other major institutions the same deep concern, selfless service, generous support, and forceful leadership that he tendered Adirondack Trust."

Those were among the words of a resolution written and presented by President Joseph C. Palamountain Jr. at a January meeting of the Adirondack Trust Board of Directors to pay tribute to Newman E. "Pete" Wait Jr., the Adirondack Trust Company president and Skidmore trustee who died in a Dec. 18 fire at his Lake George summer home.

Saratoga civic leaders reacted with shock to the news of Mr. Wait's sudden death. More than 700 community members filled the Canfield Casino for a memorial service Dec. 21.

Mr. Wait was a leader in the resurgence of Saratoga Springs over the last two decades. He was instrumental in Skidmore's growth in facilities and enrollment and also in the creation of the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, having served as president of the SPAC Board from 1968 through 1972.

Mr. Wait was the third member of his family to serve on the Skidmore Board of Trustees, continuing a tradition that began with Skidmore's founding as a four-year college in 1922. It was that year that Luther Wait, Pete's uncle, was elected as a local representative on the Board of the fledgling institution.

Ten years later, upon his brother's departure, Newman E. Wait Sr. joined the Board; he served for 32 years until his retirement from the presidency of Adirondack Trust and the Skidmore Board in 1964. Newman E. Wait Jr. was elected to the Skidmore Board on Feb. 20, 1965.

Among Mr. Wait's other local civic work was his leadership of Yaddo, the Saratoga artists' retreat, an institution he served as president from 1969 until his death.

He was also well known locally for his work with the New York Racing Association, the Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club, and the United Fund. He

had served as a trustee of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, the City Center Acting Company, and Sunnyview Hospital in Schenectady.

To his friends and colleagues at Skidmore, Mr. Wait was known as a person of integrity, humanity, seriousness, and wit. As chair of the Executive Committee, he was one whose presence was felt regularly and unmistakably during the years through which Skidmore executed its move from Union Avenue to North Broadway.

"Pete brought to the college a keen intelligence, vision, acute good judgment, dedication to principle, and a high seriousness combined with a wonderful wit and erudition," Provost and Acting President David W. Marcell told the *Saratogian/Tri-County News*. "If I had to sum it up in one word, I would call it character."

Area newspapers paid tribute to Mr. Wait for his lifelong contributions to Saratoga and the Capital District. The *Saratogian* heralded him as "a man of vision, humanism and selflessness."

"Pete Wait loved Saratoga Springs like he loved his family," the editorial continued. "Indeed, Saratoga Springs was his family. And to that family he gave selflessly of his time, his money, his intellect, his spirit."

The Schenectady *Gazette* saluted him for helping the region "become a national leader in the arts and in education," and for helping to "guide higher education at one of the nation's top schools."

"In the time since his death, many tributes have been paid Mr. Wait," the *Gazette* editorial concluded. "But the most eloquent are those things which live on in the community, enriching the lives of all they touch. It is a remarkable legacy."

One of the legacies Mr. Wait left behind is a unique perspective of the way in which Skidmore and Saratoga support and relate to one another. He knew and understood the priorities of both, and performed the task of promoting and maintaining town-gown relations that are the envy of most cities and institutions.

Himself a graduate of Cornell University, Mr. Wait knew the difference between an excellent institution and a mediocre one, and worked hard to keep Skidmore among the ranks of the excellent.

During the Wide Horizon Program fund-raising campaign, Mr. Wait was recruited to give his thoughts on tape for a multi-media show which stated the pur-

pose of the campaign and its support of Skidmore's philosophy. The words recorded almost six years ago reveal Mr. Wait's commitments to Skidmore's excellence and progress.

"It is much too easy to slide into a lot of trite phrases that any college would say about itself," he said. "We have a tradition of excellence. Well, I think every institution believes it has that. Or we could say, 'We offer such a wide diversity of courses and yet give the kind of attention that only a small college can give.' I think every small college I've talked to believes that

about itself. All I know is that Skidmore seems to really achieve those things better than most of the small colleges I know."

And if any trustee knew the details of Skidmore's move to the Jonsson campus, Pete Wait did.

"Every time you go up there, there's a new building and it's kind of exciting to see how much change is taking place. And then you step back and look at this over a longer perspective and you think, 'My God, it's taking forever to finally get it all in one piece and up there.' I guess we now finally are going to do that."

Professor Becker Named to Administrative Post

Longtime faculty member Beverly J. Becker has "eagerly accepted" an appointment as administrative fellow in the dean of the faculty's office from Feb. 1 to Aug. 31. Dean Eric J. Weller will be on a sabbatical leave during that time, and Associate Dean David Seligman will assume Weller's duties.

According to Weller, Dr. Becker is the first faculty member ever to become an administrative fellow at the college. Previous fellowships have been served by visiting professors, he explained.

Strong administrative skills and the respect of peers were two of the qualities necessary for the fellowship. "Bev was an immediate standout," Weller said. "She has proven herself as a top administrator in a very complex department."

A member of the faculty since 1959, Dr. Becker earned her A.B. degree in political science at Wellesley College, her M.Ed. in physical education at the University of North Carolina and her Ph.D. degree from the University of Oregon. Prior to joining the Skidmore faculty, Dr. Becker had been an instructor at the University of Nebraska and Mt. Holyoke College. She chaired Skidmore's Department of Physical Education and Dance from 1968 to 1980.

Dr. Becker has consulted with local and state agencies on physical fitness and heart disease, and has long been active in the Eastern Association for Physical Education of College Women. In 1977, she was given the EAPECW Merit Award for "meritorious service through teaching, writing, research and/or positions of leadership in the EAPECW and other professional organizations." Last year, she was elected a vice president of the National Association for Physical Education in Higher Education.

Her campus responsibilities include membership on committees concerned with promotions, sabbaticals and tenure, financial planning and long range planning.

In her new position, Dr. Becker will devote considerable attention to the faculty handbook, a publication that describes the rights, responsibilities, benefits and governance of the 170 full-time members of the Skidmore faculty. In addition, she will begin a new project, a department chairpersons' handbook, which will explain administrative responsibilities of the office for new department heads.

Dr. Becker will work with the various faculty committees reviewing the early stages of development of the college's new curriculum.

Pianist Edward Hausman: A Teacher at Heart

On January 6, 1984, Professor of Music Edward G. Hausman performed a recital of piano works at Carnegie Recital Hall in New York City. Prior to his recital, Professor Hausman was interviewed by Jim Reilly, a staff writer for the Saratogian. Portions of Mr. Reilly's interview — which appeared in the December 16, 1983, issue of the Saratogian — are reprinted here with permission.

Edward Hausman is a lucky man. Just ask him, he'll tell you himself.

Hausman, who has taught piano and music at Skidmore College for almost 27 years, can't understand why someone would want to know his story, even if it is a happy one. He is surprised and flattered, perhaps a bit embarrassed, as he ushers two visitors into his office.

He offers a sheaf of papers, one of which is a flyer announcing the piano recital he will give at Carnegie Hall in New York City on Jan. 6. There's also a photocopy of a *New York Times* review of "some young hotshot piano player" — him — in his debut at Carnegie on Oct. 5, 1956. Edward Downes described him as "a gifted young American pianist" who played with "stylistic assurance, straightforward musical feeling and a solid tone."

A year after he made his Carnegie Hall debut at 30, Hausman came to Saratoga Springs to teach at Skidmore. This January, he returns to New York. In between, there have been recitals in Boston and Detroit, three seasons with the First Piano Quartet, more recitals in Tokyo and Seoul.

But primarily, there has been teaching. "I'm a very lucky man. I have it made, teaching here," Hausman says. "Working with these young students, it's very rewarding and fulfilling. And whenever I want to give a recital, I can gather together a family of friends for support. I know I'm appreciated here."

Hausman sits, a little stiffly so his picture can be taken, on the bench of a big black Steinway grand that occupies a quarter of his office. A big brown Mason & Hamlin adjacent to it takes up another quarter.

He runs through a perfunctory history, including his graduation from Juilliard and recitals in Japan and South Korea during sabbaticals from teaching in the early 1960s. His Jan. 6 recital stems from a sabbatical he took this year.

"I chose this life. I decided teaching was to be the thing, and all those other things fit in around that," he says.

"I'm very lucky. I'd do what I'm doing without being paid. And lo and behold the world sees fit to pay me for it too," he says. "People ask me what my hobbies are, and I tell them music. A man is lucky when his vocation and his avocation are the same."

If he's so happy with his life here, why go to New York?

"Oh, it's high time. There are a lot of people who are wondering about me. I want to show them that I'm still among the quick. Maybe less quick than I was, but still ..."

There's another reason. Hausman thinks musicians have a responsibility to get out and play with and for other people. Pianists must.

"Pianists are like groundhogs. They close the drapes and sit inside and play, and once a year stick their heads out. The music becomes sufficient unto itself."

He points to a yellowed newspaper obituary of Glenn Gould that hangs on his wall.

"He did that," Hausman says, "he retired from the recital and concert world to make records. He thought that was how he could best share his music. But that's weird. To leave people and retire to the world of gadgetry ... You can't make music like that. You can't do it all by yourself."

"Piano playing is not an end in itself; I tell my students that. It's a means to an end, the end of expressing the joy of being alive, of being human. There's a certain responsibility to share it with others, that joy. That's what a recital is. It's an expression of joy."

Hausman has put together a varied program — he calls it "catholic," a "smorgasbord" of musical styles — for his

Carnegie Hall recital. It ranges from the mathematic purity of a Bach fantasia to the power of a Beethoven sonata to the lush romanticism of a Rachmaninoff etude. Some of the pieces, like the Beethoven, Hausman has been playing for more than 30 years. He has strong feelings about all of them.

He also has strong feelings about variety. He thinks it is essential to a well-balanced musical diet.

Hausman slips onto the bench of the Steinway and plays the last few bars of the Beethoven sonata, then holds his fingers over the keys, letting the rich tones of the piano fade into silence. "It's like the end of the world, the end of music history," he says. "No wonder Brahms waited till he was in his 42nd year before coming out with his first symphony."

"Beethoven is the meat and potatoes of music. But you'd die of beri-beri if you only ate meat and potatoes," Hausman says. "Beethoven is profound. But if Beethoven was all I played, I'd be so profound I couldn't stand it. You need a little relief, like ... Shostakovich," and he whips into a brief, bouncy excerpt from Shostakovich's "Age of Gold."

Then he plays Ravel, Prokofiev, Rachmaninoff, Bach, switching easily from one style to another, almost without pause, playing the Steinway with his jacket buttoned and his rubbers on.

Hausman is not sure how the critics and the audience in New York will react to his recital. Having lived in New York an aggregate of ten years, he is not intimidated by either the city or its people.

Even so, there will be the opening night jitters.

"The first five minutes, there is no way to describe if you've never experienced it," Hausman said. "You're standing there, and there's a wide abyss and a tightrope and you have to say 'OK, remove the net. Here I come.' It's either an act of real presumption, or fools rush in. I don't know which."

"All you can do before you go out is stick your fist in the air," Hausman says, pointing his fist toward the ceiling and gritting his teeth, "and say to God or whatever you believe in 'OK, I've done everything I could to prepare for this, so now you take it from here,' then rrrfffff," he groans, swinging his arm down and out before him, "out you go."

CRITICAL PRAISE FOR HAUSMAN'S PERFORMANCE

(Excerpt from a review by Tim Page which appeared in the January 8 issue of the *New York Times*.)

"The largest work on Edward Hausman's Friday evening concert of piano music at Carnegie Recital Hall was Serge Prokofiev's mammoth Sonata No. 6 in A (Op. 82). Mr. Hausman convincingly captured the sonata's panoramic sweep — its mixture of the harsh and the lyrical, the graceful and sardonic ... his comprehension of the music was not to be doubted."

"The program also included a performance of Beethoven's Sonata in E (Op. 109); the final set of variations was marked by a sense of repose and quietude . . ."

Limon Dance Company Plans Skidmore Residency

The world-renowned Jose' Limon Dance Company of New York City has been awarded a \$35,000 grant by the New York State Council on the Arts to support an International Choreographic Residency next summer at Skidmore College.

The program, scheduled for June 18 through July 28 at Skidmore, will provide a comprehensive dance curriculum to 40 experienced students (aged 16 and older) and teachers from throughout the country during the first three weeks of the residency.

In addition, approximately 15 professional-level dancers will apprentice with

the Limon Company for the full six weeks of the residency. The company is currently touring Europe and the U.S. and will select the apprentices from auditions held during the tour, including a special audition in the Capital District.

Just prior to the Skidmore residency, the company will perform in Finland and at the Cologne Modern Dance Festival in West Germany. The Limon stay at Skidmore will culminate in six performances at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center. The company will then continue its tour in Mexico and Switzerland.

Theater Department Presents "Gemini"

"An intelligent, warm, convincing reading of ... a funny, touching play about people growing up, going away and connecting with themselves and the people around them."

Such was one area critic's reaction to the Skidmore theater department's fall production, *Gemini*, the Obie-Award-winning play by Albert Innaurato. Directed by Assistant Professor of Theater Carolyn Anderson, *Gemini* played several performances in early December to enthusiastic audiences which included drama lovers from all over the Capital District.

Set in Innaurato's native "South Philly," *Gemini* is mainly concerned with the social and sexual doubts and fears of Harvard scholarship student Francis Geminiani (played by George Markham '85) who is paying a visit home for his 21st birthday party. Other members of the cast included Francis's Radcliffe girl friend and her Harvard-student brother (Denise McDonald '84 and Daniel Englander '85), and two weirdly hilarious neighbors, played by Sarah Greenman '84 and William Pryor '86.


George Siletzky, a graduate of Union College and the Mason Gross School of the Arts and a veteran of numerous community and college productions, took the part of Francis's father, Fran, a good-hearted man albeit almost as confused by life's perplexities as his son. Fran's quiet and timid lady friend, Lucille, was played by professional actress Shelley Wyant. A member of Capital Repertory Company, an Albany-based Equity theater company, Ms. Wyant has performed extensively in television and in some 16 Off and Off Off Broadway productions. She is currently in residence at Skidmore as a teaching guest artist, as are three other members of Capital Rep.

In the course of an interview while *Gemini* was still in rehearsal, Ms. Wyant referred to her Skidmore teaching experience as "a natural evolution" in her professional career. Asserting that she "tripped onto something valuable" when she decided to combine her busy performing schedule with teaching at Skidmore College, she said that she finds it particularly stimulating to work with students "at a formative point in their lives, while they are still open and loose about their work."

"College students," she pointed out, "are still learning. Every year they have three or four crises in their lives that they experience very deeply. *Gemini* shows how young people regard each new crisis as the end of the world. The play makes you laugh at some serious things and, through laughter, the problems become smaller. There is no resolution in the work, but there is hope."

The daily presence on campus of visiting artists such as Ms. Wyant and Mr. Siletzky constitutes an invaluable learning experience for students, providing them with what Theater Department Chair Alan Brody refers to as "models of excellence and daring."

In the course of the academic year, the theater department stages two "fully mounted" productions such as *Gemini*. These extensive productions (Shakespeare's *As You Like It* is coming up for spring) provide students with hands-on experience in the coordination and integration of all



Guest professional artists Shelley Wyant and George Siletzky: providing models of "excellence and daring."


George Markham '85 and Sarah Greenman '84 perform on set designed by Theater Professor Lawrence Opitz.

aspects of theater: acting, directing, management, technical theater and design. Special publicity comes into play. Tickets are printed and sold at the box office. Costumes are designed and worn, and sets can be as detailed and elaborate as the wonderfully realistic South Philly backyard scene created for *Gemini* by Assistant Professor Lawrence Opitz, complete with fig tree, hose and genuine dirt. "We haven't done a realistic, heavily-mounted set like this in four or five years," Opitz said, "and I think it's important to expose our actors, designers and technical people to that part of the theater."

But equally important to the students' learning experience, according to the theater faculty, are the numerous student-generated (and sometimes student-scripted) workshop productions presented throughout the year, both in the theater proper and in various (and sometimes unexpected) spaces on and off campus.

The workshops provide a smaller, more flexible setting than the fully-mounted productions. Professor Brody has explained, a setting consistent with his department's "process, not product" orientation. In the workshop experience, students can focus their attention upon theater as a mode of creative expression, rather than on the details involved in mounting a large production for the stage. They feel free to experiment, to explore, to take risks and assess the results. It is through this process, Brody asserts, that students learn to take responsibility for their own creative vision.

Workshops, special lectures and critiques with visiting artists (in residence for several days at a time), gallery exhibits, films, plus many lively social events—all contribute to the sense of intensive artistic endeavor that has distinguished Summer SIX since its beginnings 16 years ago.



It has been described by James Kettlewell, Skidmore associate professor of art history and a recognized authority on Saratoga art and architecture, as "im-

portant and unique" because of its completeness and for its "multiplicity and diversity."

Mrs. Yates said she was "overwhelmed and flattered" by the Skidmore alumni honor. "It's really very thrilling to be placed in the company of such distinguished people," she said.

Mrs. Yates and her husband, Harry, former president of Albany's Home Savings Bank, lived for many years on North Broadway in Saratoga before moving back to Albany more than 20 years ago. They also maintain a winter home in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.
