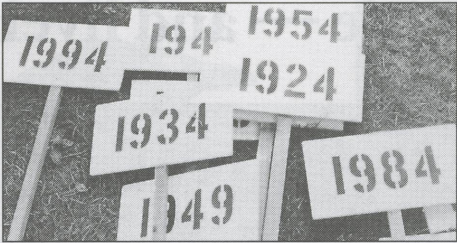

Curtain calls and encores

No sooner had Skidmore’s newest graduates finished celebrating at Commencement ’99 than hundreds of fellow alumni from every era flooded campus to rekindle and relive their own glory days. See inside for highlights of Commencement and Reunion weekends.

Periclean celebrates life — and liveliness — of the mind

Each May, on the day before Commencement, Periclean gives a brief and graceful demonstration of what the Skidmore honor society is all about.

First, honors go to the seniors (20 this spring) who are inducted into the society on the strength of their grade-point averages of 3.4 or better. Honor is also showered on the Periclean Scholar Award winners, whose presentations of their research or creative projects transform the Filene Recital Hall audience — an eager crowd of families, faculty, and friends — into a society of the mind. In those moments, Skidmore might well epitomize the classical polis of Athens under the leadership of Pericles, for whom the honor society is named. That golden age of Pericles was “a time of artistic and intellectual accomplishment,” remarked Associate Professor of Anthropology and Acting Dean of the Faculty Susan Bender. “Your work and your commitment to the highest ideals of our community make you leaders of our polis.”

This year, the awards went to two students in English and history and three in music and theater. But all the presenters radiated stage presence, starting with history major Adam Citron. “If a man were placed in our society with three eyes in his head,” Citron began, “he could not have been more at odds with the times than John Lilburne was in 17th-century England.” Lilburne was a Leveller, Citron explained, a member of a Puritan sect determined to “level” the tyrannies of church and government in Oliver Cromwell’s England. The outspoken and deeply religious Lilburne was jailed, exiled, whipped, and pilloried for his beliefs. Citron, whose research readings included 15 Lilburne tracts and the 1803 Journals of the Houses of Lords and Commons, is considering graduate study in history.

In her fetchingly titled medieval-literature thesis, “Whan Tendre Youth Hath Wedded Stoupyng Age,” English major Tricia Placido presented a fictional character as compelling as Citron’s Lilburne: the *senex amans*, or old lover, who takes a “tendre” young bride. Tracing this figure from Roman comedy to medieval fabliaux and romance, Placido noted that the old lover was perennially depicted as dandified and lustful — characteristics that medieval people considered not merely inappropriate but sinfully unnatural. So the elderly swain was cruelly “mocked, scorned, and always, *always* cuckolded,” she explained. Only in

Chaucer’s “Merchant’s Tale” did the poet’s art “transform this stock character into a human being with needs, motivations, and desires,” said Placido, who will pursue medieval studies at the graduate level.

Next, actors Geoffrey Pomeroy and Gwyneth Dobson brought out two folding chairs and a champagne bottle to set the stage for their scene from Paula Vogel’s *How I Learned to Drive*. Dobson played Li’l Bit, who learns about incest, love, and driving from her Uncle Peck (Pomeroy). “Acting is a risky thing,” Pomeroy pointed out. “You can’t hit the backspace if you make a mistake.” But Dobson and Pomeroy handled their poignant short scene with assurance; good friends and longtime theater companions, both have studied at Skidmore’s Shakespeare Programme in England, and they starred opposite each other last fall in Tom Stoppard’s *Arcadia*. Both plan to pursue professional acting careers.

The final presentation was performed by Filene Scholar (and this year’s Periclean president) Samantha Day. A member of Skidmore’s vocal chamber ensemble, chorus, and opera workshop, Day

had sung the role of the mother in last December’s *Amahl and the Night Visitors* at Skidmore. The winner of numerous vocal competitions and awards, she will seek a master’s degree in music and pursue a performance career in opera. Before singing Richard Strauss’s brooding “Nacht” and the rippling Puccini aria “O mio babbino caro” from *Gianni Schicchi*, Day explained the mood and context of each. Then, performing to piano accompaniment, she poured out a voice as rich and pure as maple syrup — earning the delighted applause of the entire Periclean polis. ■ —BAM

Commencement offers advice and celebration for all

A warm spring drizzle gained gusto enough to cancel the traditional recessional and lawn reception after the College’s 88th commencement exercises in May. But the ceremony began with neither rain nor damp spirits as the Class of ’99 marched to the skirl and thump of the Schenectady Pipe Band down a misty green lawn into the Saratoga Performing Arts Center.

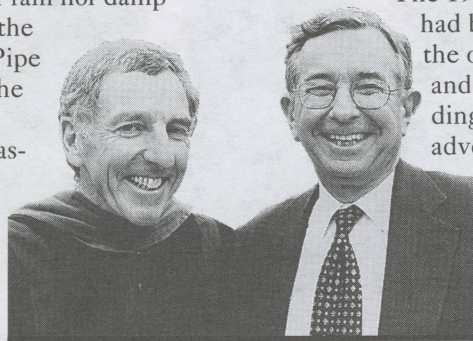
There the 555 bachelor’s and 20 master’s candidates were saluted with the roar and rise of the crowd and greeted with welcoming remarks. Said Joan Layng Dayton ’63, chair of Skidmore’s board of trustees, “You have learned to listen and to hear, to think and to comprehend, to learn and to continue to do so,” and Interim President Phyllis Roth celebrated “the texture of your years at Skidmore — the self-doubt as well as the triumph.”

And one honoree after another discussed the complex texture of life, beginning with Kitty Carlisle Hart, acclaimed singer, actor, writer, and chair emerita of the New York State Council on the Arts. Hart’s varied career has encompassed grand opera, two books, Broadway shows, movies (from the Marx Brothers’ 1935 *Night at the Opera* to Woody Allen’s *Radio Days*), and a stint on the 1960s TV quiz show *To Tell the Truth*. In accepting her Skidmore doctor of letters degree, Hart confided to the graduates, “Like you, I too was a beginner — on this very stage, 30 years ago, when I first sang in *Die Fledermaus*. I was very nervous, and you will be too. It goes together, being young and nervous.” But, she reassured them, “it gets better, I promise you.”

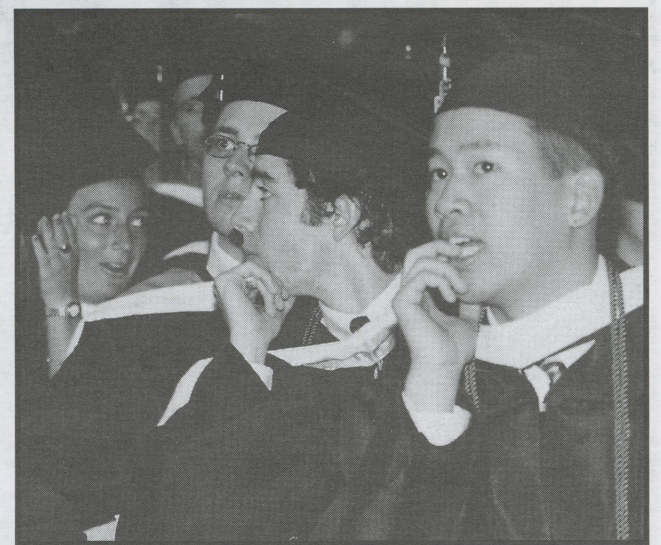
Next, award-winning actor and Saratoga Springs native David Hyde Pierce accepted a doctorate of

humane letters. Best known as the yuppie psychiatrist Niles Crane in the hit TV comedy *Frasier*, Pierce is also a national advocate for Alzheimer’s disease research.

The 1981 Yale graduate insisted that he had been “going” to Skidmore since the old campus was the new campus — and the new campus was just for sledding.” He warmly recalled childhood adventures such as sneaking into Filene Recital Hall to play its piano with the son of a faculty member. And he gratefully described how lectures and concerts at the College had exhilarated his parents, and provided a



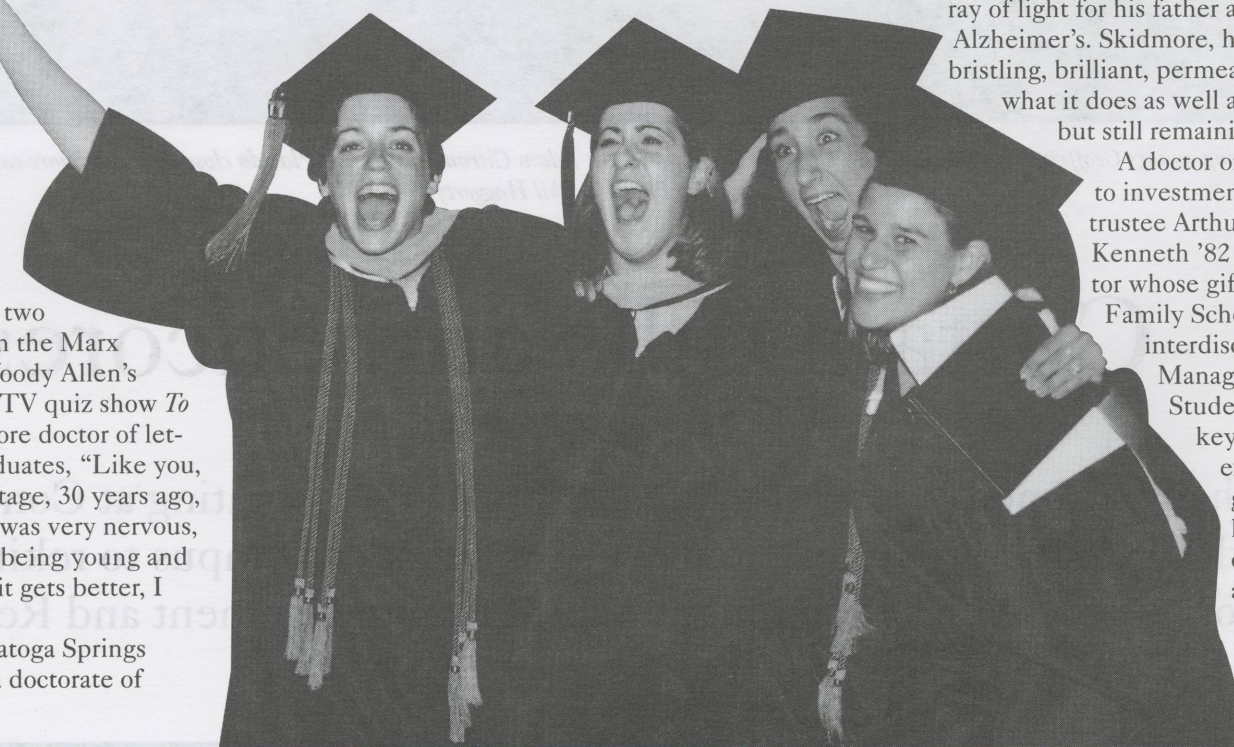
Dean Donald McCormack and honoree Arthur Zankel, P ’82, ’92 (Photos by Phil Haggerty)



ray of light for his father as he struggled with Alzheimer’s. Skidmore, he said, is “a teeming, bristling, brilliant, permeable membrane... doing what it does as well as it can possibly be done, but still remaining open to the world.”

A doctor of laws degree was awarded to investment manager and College trustee Arthur Zankel, father of Kenneth ’82 and James ’92. A benefactor whose gifts include the Zankel Family Scholarship fund and the interdisciplinary Zankel Chair in Management for Liberal Arts Students, Zankel has been a key architect of the College’s exceptional endowment growth. His address wittily graded the “tests” his own generation had faced: an A for “the absence of

major threats to peace since World War II,” an F for the recent racial and genocidal miniwars, and an A for the U.S. economy, despite its “downward spiral for the poor — and *you* can make a difference here,” he told the graduates.

Next, in remarks humorously punctuated with bursts of heroic music from *Chariots of Fire*, Senior Class President Jeremy Sigel spoke of the texture of the Skidmore experience. “We came from different backgrounds and possessed diverse outlooks and talents,” Sigel reminded his classmates. “But through the

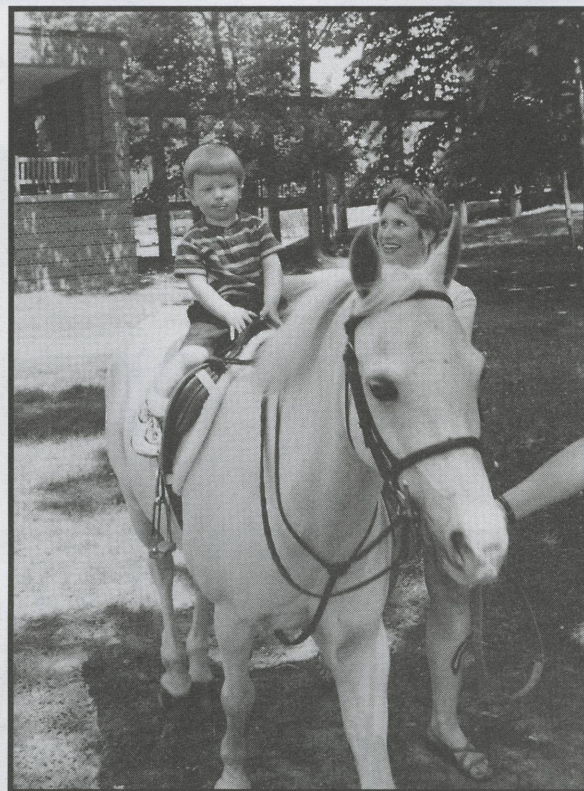

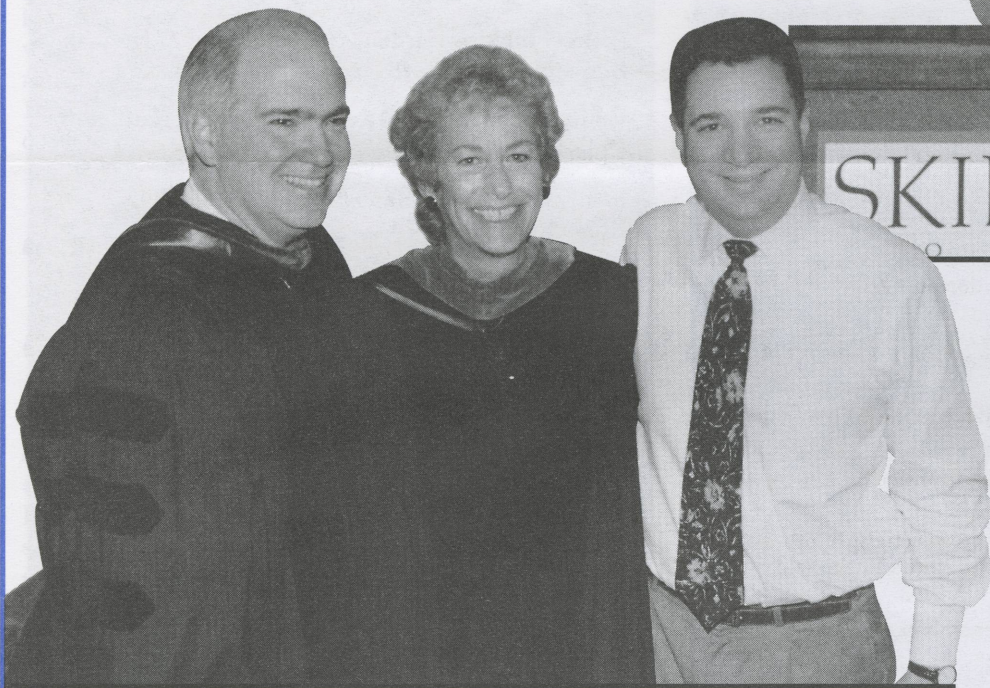

Reluctant heroes:

With coaxing, six alumni accept honors

It was a tough spring for Alumni Awards Committee chair Joseph Napolitano '85. As he told the Reunion crowd, "I've never had to argue so hard with so many people to convince them that they really deserved the honors we wanted to give them." One of them — his former Skidmore boss when he was a student reunion assistant — mounted quite a vigorous protest. But, he quipped, "I can be *very* persuasive." And as a result, several of Skidmore's most dedicated, if most modest, alumni received well-earned awards and acclaim from their Skidmore peers.

DISTINGUISHED ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Constance Masciale Carino '58 is founder and executive director of Philadelphia's Wellness Community, which provides free support services to cancer patients and their families. A specialist in psychiatric nursing (in the 1980s, she was both clinical director at the hospital and department head at the nursing school of the University of Pennsylvania), Carino always urged patients to stay positive and reach for a higher quality of life, both to feel better mentally and to enhance physical recovery. Her convictions are also very personal: she lost a sister to breast cancer and, soon afterward, survived a battle with it herself. In 1996, in recognition of her leadership in the cancer wellness movement, she became the first nurse ever to receive the Gimbel Philadelphia Award — one of the city's highest honors — presented by two distinguished medical schools.

In accepting her Skidmore award, Carino praised the education she'd received in the College's nursing major — to rousing cheers from the nursing contingent in the audience. Carino, who went on to earn a master's and doctorate in nursing from Catholic University, said it was Skidmore's faculty, and their cutting-edge research, that first taught her to integrate psychological and social concerns in nursing care. "We were educated to be the thoroughbreds of the nursing profession," she said.

OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARDS

Retired teacher Evelyn Mitchell Blackhall '49 has served as a class and reunion volunteer, alumni board member, and president of the Schenectady Alumni Club. Blackhall explained that her class's 50th-reunion costumes were inspired by the Jenny Joseph poem "Warning," which begins, "When I am an old woman, I shall wear purple/ With a red hat which doesn't go, and doesn't suit me./ And I shall spend my pension on brandy and summer gloves..." Blackhall also remarked that Skidmore was very much a singing school in her day — and then she and her classmates delighted the crowd by singing a special "forty-niners" song.

Janet Lucas Whitman '59, the former mayor of Summit, N.J., has been a major donor and fundraising

volunteer; her support includes the Whitman Family Scholarship and the Whitman Family Prize in Art History at Skidmore. As a trustee since 1994 and as co-chair of the Tang Teaching Museum and Art Gallery advisory committee, Whitman told the audience, it's been "a privilege to be part of a board that chose Antoine Predock to design the Tang museum and also chose Skidmore's new president." She added that working for Skidmore always helped "renew and reinspire" her.

Health-care philanthropist Susan Kettering Williamson '59 has been a key Skidmore benefactor and trustee for more than 20 years; she has received the trustees' Kemball-Cook Award and was recently awarded an honorary doctorate of humane letters. "Skidmore is a wonderful family," she told the audience. And she quoted her grandfather: "Nothing is ever built to touch the sky unless someone dreamed that it could, someone believed that it would, and someone willed that it must." That kind of vision and effort, she said, describes Skidmore well.

Dale Owen Coxe '64 credits Skidmore's government

faculty and other mentors with preparing her for the challenge of being one of just two women in her graduate-school class at Brown University. A former Boston city planner and currently vice chair of her town's finance committee, she was initially reluctant to take on volunteer work for Skidmore, but she said, "curiosity got the better of me, and I ended up serving two wonderful terms as alumni-board president." Currently a trustee, and recently co-chair of the Tang advisory committee, Coxe said she enjoyed helping Skidmore thrive, and she urged her fellow alumni to get involved too.

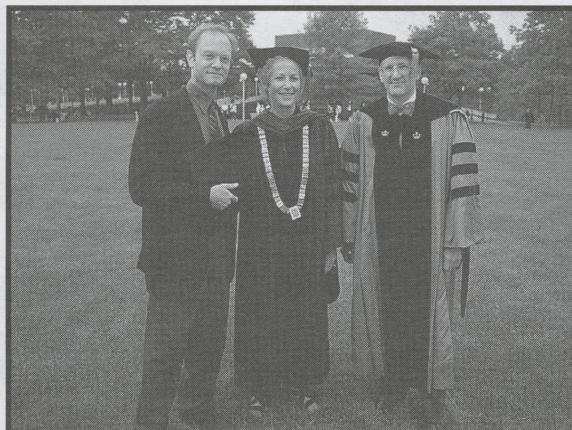
Victoria Greene Aldrich '74 was a Skidmore staff member for more than 20 years, coordinating alumni programs, database services, and special events. This year she began a new career in real estate. Recalling how she'd helped initiate Skidmore's alumni awards program, she said, "I'm humbled to join the ranks of these outstanding people." She added, "I cherish all that my alma mater has given me. I've been challenged and rewarded, and I look forward to doing more on behalf of the college that I love." ■

past four years, we have shared our thoughts, our passions, our opinions, our *selves*. Consequently, we have altered our own visions. Our enriched ability to look at the world is the true gift of Skidmore — a gift we have given each other."

Last to speak was Professor of English Thomas Lewis, chosen by the graduating class to deliver the keynote speech. In the instructively entertaining style that has earned him Emmy and Peabody awards for books and films on American life, Lewis quoted a figure from his research, one William Mulholland. Invited to speak at the opening of one of the 67 dams and aqueducts he had built to bring water to Los Angeles, Mulholland uttered just five words: "Here's your water. Use it." Said Lewis, "If we taught you well, we created in each of you a discriminating mind. You will use it to distinguish between the sublime and the banal, the false and the true. You will use it to gain perspective on the pain and joy in life." Then, with a rhetorical bow to Mulholland, Lewis said succinctly, "Here's your degree. Use it." ■ —BAM

Class of '49 leads reunion-giving effort

Ohs and ahhs flew thick and fast during the presentation of class gifts at Reunion '99, as class-fund volunteers announced their totals and handed over the goods, symbolized by bank bags stuffed with daffodil bulbs to be planted around campus.

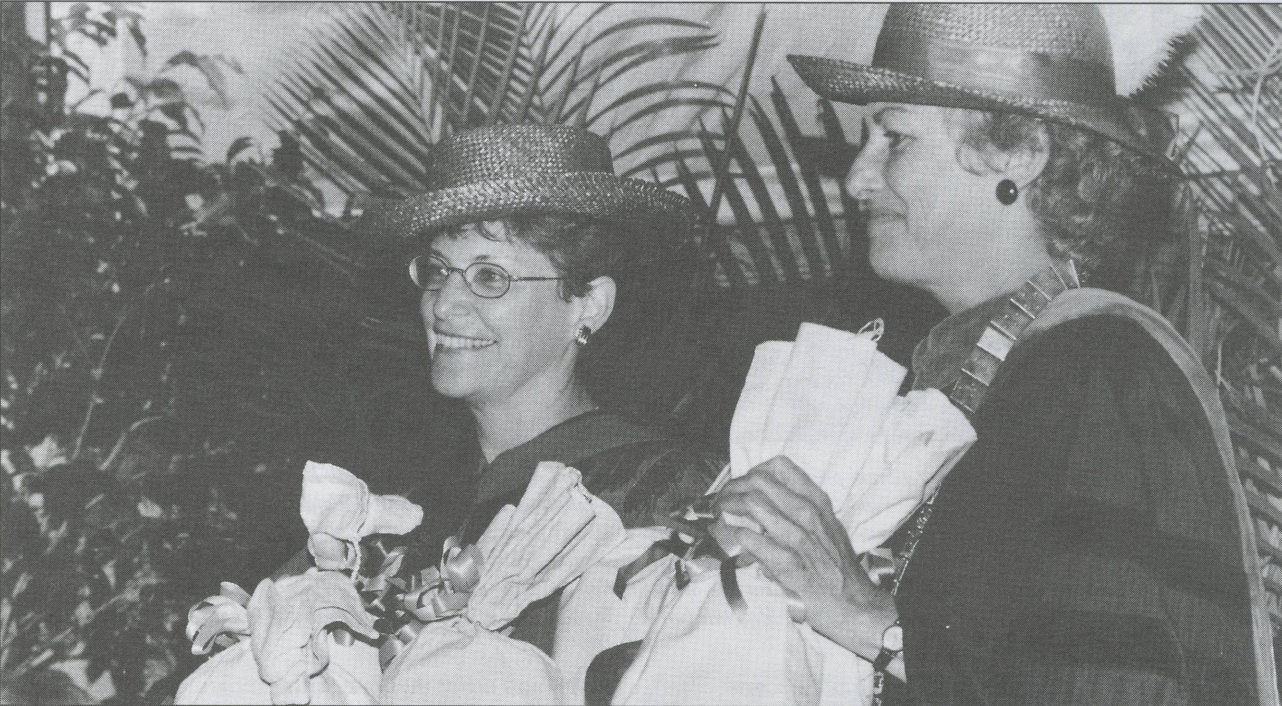
All 10 reunion classes from 1949 to 1994 surpassed their previous records for participation rates or for total dollars raised. Four classes set new reunion records, including the Class of '44, which ended the 10-year reign of '34 as the biggest 55th-reunion fundraisers; the Class of '59, which set a new 40th-reunion dollar record; and the Class of '79, which set a new mark for 20th-reunion giving and earned this year's reunion award for the largest increase in Annual Fund gifts raised by a pre-25th-reunion class.

But, in keeping with tradition, it was the 50th-reunion class that stole the show. The '49ers brought in almost

\$382,000 total, of which some \$228,000 was for the Annual Fund. Not only did they win the reunion award for largest Annual Fund gift this year, but they now hold the record for the largest annual gift ever for a single class. The '49ers also earned the reunion award for highest participation, with a whopping 81 percent of the class making a gift. And to top it off, the class was presented with the President's Award for Highest Achievement.

The grand total was presented in the form of a gigantic bank check for just over \$2 million, payable to Skidmore College. As usual, reunion giving accounted for a significant percentage of Annual Fund gifts from alumni; this year the Annual Fund enjoyed a 40 percent participation rate and topped \$2.6 million — making this the fifth year in a row that the total has increased.

Next year's Annual Fund participation goal is an ambitious 42 percent. Stay tuned for the results next summer. ■
